1.	It seems homeowners in Nelson are somewhat subsidizing recreation, maybe we could get a price break on monthly or annual passes in recognition of that
2.	Since the pandemic, it's been harder to connect with others and build a strong sense of community. The Community Recreation Campus has a real opportunity to change that. Music and art bring people together, and Nelson has long been known for its incredible arts and music scene. Right now, though, there's a gap when it comes to space for our local arts community to come together and thrive. A dedicated space at the recreation center would not only provide room for creativity but also create a place where people can collaborate, inspire one another, and strengthen the cultural connections that make Nelson unique. Keeping admission fees and rental costs affordable would make the space accessible to more people, especially those who need it most but may struggle to cover the costs. After all, this is what community is all about creating a place where everyone has the opportunity to participate and connect.
3.	The school basketball courts are not accessible to the public and difficult for community groups to access. We had no access for the whole summer - with 4 local boys on the Kootenay Team for BC Summer Games that could only practice in Fernie as a result of SD8 policies. As a volunteer for Nelson Hoops and Kootenay Chill we would love to have a court accessible to the kids on weekends for games/tournaments.
4.	Having 2 ice rinks is super important. I've been unable to play hockey the last 3 months due to over subscription. It would be amazing to have the civic back open The ndcc rec center is amazing but is getting expensive. It would be nice if prices were maintained for a while. Toonie time is great. We should have more
5.	Indoor tennis. Would love indoor tennis courts at Civic Centre / Community Complex, or else a dome over the courts at Lakeside Park or LVR.
6.	Pickleball is exploding in popularity and is an activity that people in their 60's to 80's can do and thereby improving their general health and fitness.
7.	It seems that many spaces are currently under utilized. This survey is a good first step in making meaningful improvements.
8.	I would like to see the hours for the pool extended. Maybe closing at 9 or 10pm instead of 8pm.
9.	It would be great if the city could utilize what is there and keep soccer and curling in our community
10.	It should be used for recreation only. Never housing.
11.	Share the public owned spaces between user groups so that they equally serve as many groups as possible. Ie. If the dance umbrella studio is also used by other groups, perhaps we'd get the most out of a single facility. If there is need for more, we'd build more studios. These larger spaces owned by the city should serve as many groups as possible.
12.	More promotion of open use or open space. would love to drop in for soccer time on the field or swim time or ice time.
13.	A cold plunge would be a great addition to the cold shower/waterfall
14.	Build a new indoor soccer centre
15.	Investment into a good large gym that everyone can use is needed. The high schools don't seem to let people use their gyms and Mary Hall is over used!
16.	I think utilizing the existing buildings and doing the renovations to reopen what has closed would be high priority. Such as the curling club and civic Center. Once the current buildings are taken care of than look at new projects. Such as a trampoline park
17.	I think a recreational priority should be for activities that can be enjoyed throughout a lifespan. For example, swimming is an activity that the youngest and oldest members of our community can enjoy at all times. Our community needs a larger poolto accommodate all aquatic activities. I would argue very few of the oldest members of our community play competitive hockey throughout their lifespans and I would prefer not to prioritize ice hockey.

18. I hope it includes pickleball and other fun physical options that create fun exercise opportunities for seniors
19. This is a poorly done and executed survey. I want the RDCK and city to practice belt tightening, increased efficiency. more prudent use of taxes and funds. RDCK should not be expanding in any direction, they are having a hard enough time administering tasks they already have. RDCK has no business involved in "housing."
20. It should include a Curling rink.
21. We need more indoor and outdoor pickleball courts. We have hundreds of players and not enough places to play.
22. What are the chances of bringing back the Mid Summer bonspiel to kick off a revitalized curling rink. It was key to the community fabric at one time.
23. We need to make recreation a priority.
24. Pickleball is one of the fastest growing sports and I see so many happy, healthy seniors there and it breaks my heart that the spots to play in the winter are limited and so competitive. I feel that this would be amazing too to have a dedicated indoor pickelball courts for tourists to visit and to host tournaments to help boost the local economy and to introduce a new generation to this quickly growing, level-playing field sport.
25. Having a larger multi-field soccer facility in Nelson would be a great asset - both for athlete development, and to bring winter tournaments to Nelson. Currently, we are having to travel to Cranbrook for winter soccer in a better facility than our small field.
26. I believe it is undervalued for what it can, and does do for the community. Using the complex arena for other events, other than with the ice would be a great value, but I understand the floor to cover the ice was shipped to Cranbrook? The complex needs to be utilized a lot more especially during off ice months. It's very important to have children and youth involved in. A structured environment, such as hockey. The small ice surface should really be returned to the children and youth and another covered soccer venue should be built. Costs of rental has become exorbitant many people use it for fundraising for nonprofits.
27. I think we need to do away with the Nelson Civic Theatre and find better use for that space. The city has already put too much money into maintaining this facility which only caters to a few individuals. Most people watch movies at home or online. It seems crazy to heat or air-condition such a large space to cater to a very few number of people who use it or can afford it.
28. These facilities are SO important for our community to thrive! They are well used, and well loved! I think that in order for them to continue being used, the fee needs to stay reasonable.
29. The NDCC is an amazing resource for our community, I see it benefiting people of all ages. It's such a popular spot. Parking is a challenge at times. I think keeping it accessible to lower income people is important as part of the picture, and continuing to provide services for all demographics (ie young and old) for community health and wellbeing.
30. I would support maintaining and improving current facilities over building new. I don't think we need any new buildings for new activities. That said, I wouldnt be in a rush to develop the land either. Needs change and who knows what may be needed in a decade or two. These lots have high value for public infrastructure. If no clear current need is identified, just hold them. Don't build only housing on them. Housing could be included in top of public infrastructure. But not as a stand alone project.
31. It would be lovely to have the entire block enclosed with an indoor walkway. Allow people to see each recreation program and a communal area for people to hang out.
32. Please offer free access to single or low income parents and their children.
33. North shore area should have to pay more to use facilities if they aren't taxed for them. Why are the rest of us subsidizing their access? Also current registered classes should include a wristband.
34. Nelson's community recreation facilities are outdated relative to those in many communities in British Columbia. We're fortunate to live in a 'desirable' city where many people, with high incomes, have chosen to live. Likewise, property values and the corresponding taxes have increased significantly and continue to increase. In order to promote heath, well being and a strong community, it is essential to have high quality facilities accessible to the public in the city and region.

35. I feel the empty lot(s) at the corner of Front St. and Cedar St. should be used for housing operated by Nelson Cares.
36. We need 2 good ice surfaces and more open gym time for youth sports. Sd8 seems to prioritize adult groups vs. Kids
37. There are a severe lack of basketball facilities (indoor and outdoor) available to the community in the Nelson area. Those that exist are either gated by the schools - who rightly get first priority, but are also seemingly unwilling to share - or are in such high demand over the non-summer months they cannot dedicate time for basketball (Mary Hall). The youth, and adult, basketball community has grown over the past decade to the point the current options available cannot meet the demand. Please add at least two full court basketball courts to any future plans, ideally in a configuration with 8 hoops (1 regulation court that can be converted into two "short" courts side by side). Thank you for your consideration.
38. We have a great weight facility and pool area, however an open gymnasium is missing and would be a highly utilized space. And our whole facility seems to be aging when compared to other municipalities.
39. I'd obviously love to see our recreation campus be taken care of adequately. It's heartening to see and hear about the disrepair and am frustrated that foresight wasn't applied to maintaining these spaces.
40. Soccer is huge in Nelson! We need an indoor soccer facility that allows people of all ages to keep playing through the winter.
41. This is a real and great opportunity to increase and extend the recreational facility with a new and modern project. The community needs more space. The population is growing and will keep growing. The complex should attend the Nelson population, for example, the academy/ gym needs to be bigger and more soccer indoor field to attend the high demand.
42. We need more housing and parking.
43. I also think indoor tennis courts and more indoor Pickleball courts are important because we often have snow in August and people could play indoors as well as in the winter. (*Sidenote, we've had so little snow you could leave the tennis nets up at Lakeside Park. More squash courts would be good.
44. Axe the theatre and bring back curling
45. We really need a large, multi-use indoor space that's not leased to one group, but shared amongst a bunch of groups. Nelson is rad for how many niche sports and clubs go on here, but when the weather turns options are much more limited. While none of these smaller groups can afford their own facility, if we should share one, we'd likely be able to cover costs and also introduce more people to these activities. For example, if we had a derby space, we could host games as community events, bringing people together and introducing more people to the sport (and generating revenue!). The same goes for other groups. I think these smaller groups do a lot in terms of making the city feel dynamic and inviting. It's also important that we keep admission costs low, as to not exclude lower income people from these amenities.
46. Without good facilities, like an indoor soccer field, this town will continue to lose its appeal. I was born and raised here and I would consider moving if Nelson stops offering recreation opportunities for my kids. Facilities like an indoor soccer field help to keep a community strong and make this a desirable place for families.
47. hockey is an important activity to this community, across the full spectrum of age groups for both men and women. Make sure that we continue to have, at the very least, two ice surfaces available
48. Two Winters ago I curled in a league in Nelson, and the whole rink was packed every night we had curling. There is clearly a demand for it here, and the majority of the teams were 40 or under, so that interest is going to be around for a while. Curling doesn't get the glamor that certain sports like soccer get, but I feel it's an important sport for Canadian culture and pride. It would be an absolute shame to lose the curling rink. 49. What we have now could be more effectively managed. Yes, maintenance of facilities are a given and can be costly with rising costs. Very disappointed there was no questions addressing the "vacant lot". Which has nothing to do with Community recreation and fitness. Really feel I am being railroaded.
50. At a minimum more money should be spent to maintain these assets and keep them serviceable and safe into the future.

51. Ice Allocations policy need to be reviewed so they equitable. Minority groups should be considered when ice allocations is being decided and the policy needs to refelct this
52. Having a space that is currently unavailable and unrepresented for community participants elsewhere is extremely important for having a balanced and vibrant community.
53. your focus on recreation is very NARROW - how about reading/crafting/social engagement spaces and resources
54. The weight room needs to be expanded. It's far too small and outgrowing it's current use. I stopped going as I was always waiting for equipment.
55. There is a tremendous need for more childcare options. Currently new parents are unable to even be placed on a waitlist, there are NO options available. This situation has made it impossible to return to work after leave. This is something that can't be solved by private community members as facilities and properties are at a premium. I know this impacts many families and a new large scale facility that utilized the NDCC facilities would be incredible and help so many people. I have born and raised Nelson friends with young families that had to move away because of the lack of care.
56. More pickleball courts and a bigger fitness facility with more cardio machines and weights. I'm sure that place is over fire capacity quite a few times a day.
57. no additional taxation
58. For the questions around cost and taxation, I didn't feel comfortable providing an opinion because I don't have a reference point to compare to (ie: what do other communities in BC pay?) Providing the community with comparable information of what taxation costs are in other jurisdictions would be helpful.
59. Adding housing to the "recreation" campus area is a betrayal of the space available for recreation
60. I used to attend the fitness centre regularly, but no longer attend. I believe there should be a senior's rate for over 60. Also, the fitness centre is overcrowded and now full of teenagers who don't share equipment.
61. As a city of nelson taxpayer, I have bin chagrinned to find out how many people outside the city actively use the recreation complex but do not pay taxes.... How can we amend this? Can we charge more for people who do not pay the tax on the facility? Should taxpayers pay less for user fees? City of nelson residences pay for these costs through every household, and somehow I think that these costs should be leveraged for all users. Thank you for this survey.It's nice to have a voice.
62. Cannot talk to increasing taxes as am a renter - so not directly affected by this. Admission fees could vary depending on the space being used. I would accept paying higher fees for some activities than others (e.g. \$10 for a 30 minute treadmill run in winter is a lot less appealing than swimming with hot tub, sauna facilities).
63. There are many socially beneficial physical activities at the CRC, however I would like to see the RDCK expand it's view of what recreation entails. This is why I have advocated for a maker space and and artistic space for the campus. Pairing those ideas with the fitness-oriented activities would broaden the scope of activities, and incorporating public affordable housing initiative on the campus would make all of these excellent amenities immediately accessible for those who would move into that housing. I will note that the police have asked for a greater budget once again, tacking an additional \$200K to the already planned \$1M increase set between 2023-2028. In my opinion, those funds would be better spent providing services like recreation, arts, and housing which improve social cohesion and reduce the cost of living for people in the area. These are the real solutions to reducing anti-social and illegal behaviour, not more police funding, as many many studies have shown.
64. The campus has historically been identified purely for recreation purposes. NOT HOUSING! We as a community have an obligation to either currently utilize the property exclusively for expanded recreational space or preserve the space for future recreational growth.
65. With the vast love for Soccer, the current Indoor Space has limited room meaning many kids and participants may or may not be able to get into a Program and end up on a Waiting List. Additionally having a larger more modern space to play in during the Fall an Winter Season has potential to increase over all participation numbers. It would also mean year round training facilities to further the Talent in the area.

66. Full sized indoor soccer facility could not only support the local teams but bring in expedition games for sporting entertainment that isn't hockey
67. The priority should be to maintain and the increase access to current programs before adding new ones.
68. Indoor soccer seems well utilized. I know that there are those that have been turned away due to lack of spots in various leagues
69. The fitness rooms could be enhanced. Very busy.
70. Great space and at a price that keeps it accessible. Staff is top notch too. I'd be excited for some new additions but not at the cost of what's working so well for the area already.
71. Please consider the future growth of our region.
72. Having a Multipurpose event center with ability to host craft fairs, dances, performances, concerts, Expo's and other various recreation sports that are under represented due to not having a space is highly important for the health and wellbeing of the community while becoming a financial benefit for the community as well. If Creston can do it, So can we.
73. Movie theater, along with more space for classes, workshops, dance
74. While it is important to spend taxpayer dollars judiciously, there needs to be space available for many different groups, not just the most popular ones. Squash, badminton, basketball, climbing, circus group, pickleball etc All of these groups should have facilities, even shared if necessary, so that the existing user groups can grow their sport As a long time squash player, I have seen our facility broken down by real estate market effects and we have rebuilt our facility and membership so that we have a successful operation once again even through the effects of the pandemic. Our club has been in operation for over 40 years and it would be a shame to see it lost due to real estate profit motives. A shared facility that is publicly owned would ensure our sport has a future in Nelson
75. Centre functioning well with amenities is positive However Nelson citizens paying higher taxes I'm not in favour. The surrounding area uses it and Nelsonites carry the financial burden. Maybe out of towners should pay higher rate for use
76. We are so fortunate to have the recreation facilities that we do have but upkeep and improvements must be considered. Great appreciation for the over 75 years of age freebie
77. Access to all sport should be accessible and affordable
78. Make it affordable for low income. Accessible by local transit and provides parking.
79. The curling rink seems like it serves a very small demographic of our community. I'd like to see recreation expand to ensure a broader level of access to many folks and facilities that can accommodate a variety of skill levels
80. Housing is critical. Nelson CARES is corrupt and dangerously unqualified. Find a different and less controversial partner
81. Whatever you do, please keep the curling rink Also also forgot to add it would be nice to not have to go to castlegar for bowling
82. Lower user costs
83. Larger fitness center
84. I think it is fine to pay a fee for the service , but there needs to be equity so that those families or individuals that can not afford to pay are able to use the facility at a lower cost. It needs to be affordable to all and perhaps low income families can be free or low cost
85. I strongly believe we need a lot of easy to access space for dance/acrobatic teachers, physical movement classes such as Tai Chi, Qi Gong, Yoga and other similar health/spiritual movement disciplines
86. The Discover Circus gym is losing their space within a year. There are no other facilities currently offering training in aerial arts in Nelson or surrounding areas. This will be a significant loss to our community if a suitable facility is not found.
87. Children need more indoor spaces, larger turf for array of sports (football, lacrosse, soccer etc) hoping for the new climbing gym. More programs for teens at the complex, teen weights, workout classes , general programs so they use the facility respectfully.
88. We need more facilities to accommodate the need for winter recreation. And not just hockeyâ€¦a multi useable facility that can be used for a variety of sports. And let the people involved in these sports work together to design this facility and not some high paid

Vancouver professional – let the locals design their own place with the help of a facilitator.
89. Why are you calling it a campus?! By definition, a campus historically refers to the grounds and buildings of a school, college, university, or similar institution. Calling it a campus is both ill-conceived and a misnomer.
90. please make a space designated for aerial students. Discover circus is such an incredible vibrant part of Nelson and to have their own safe designated space would mean they can safely operate without fear of temporary closes in the future. From youth to adults of all ages- this is a physical sport that is both creative, tough, and mentally challenging. This is the one activity a week that provides me so much joy as I know it does for so many others. It has been more challenging and motivating than any other gym exercise or class has ever done for me. Our students worry about where the new space could be and a spot at the new rec centre could bring in a lot of traffic. Please consider making space for Discover Circus.
91. I am very passionate about the performance arts and my life is so much richer because of this art form. I would love to see a community funded facility for aerial arts (silks, hoop, straps, etc), and a dance studio that is big enough that it can be partitioned and split into two dance classes going at a time, so that adults can use it during after work times and not be pushed to only using late in the night. Discover Circus, Slava Dance, and Intuit Studios are having difficulty with landlords and as I understand, all these fundamental studios may need to close because of substantial increased rent and landlords not being interested in renting to them anymore. This performance arts facility would be low cost because all that is needed is the empty space inside - no equipment. Only good anchor points in the roof, the sliding partition, and mirrors would be the major expense here. Thank you for reading :)
92. The city and population is growing, however the recreation facility are not enough for a city this size. For example there is no dedicated indoor basketball court; the lanes at the swimming pool are always full; swim lessons sell out incredibly fast.
93. I hope that the space is well thought out to include as many different sports groups as possible.
94. This survey is so badly written with poor grammar, unclear questions, double negatives, poor subject/object clarity that I refuse to answer anything on the grounds that it will most likely not give you the message that I actually want to impart.
95. Better sound dampening would make spaces such as the arena and pool more accessible to individuals with sensory sensitivities.
96. What is the definition of benefiting the community? What is benefiting in the case of Nelson? Who is included in community.
97. We are a Circus Town, we should lean into that/ build on it. We could make Nelson a training destination for International artists if we had more circus spaces. This means more hotels booked and more revenue brought to the area.
98. I think the community could use more indoor activities for young kids that help them burn energy during the colder months.
99. There is a real problem happening right now in the Nelson area. Many recreational groups are unable to operate or operate sufficiently due to lack of space. For example, the curling rink, the civic center (hockey), the gymnastics place and the circus community. It seems like there has not been sufficient regional planning to ensure that future demands have been considered and prepared for. Recreation activities are super important to people's mental and physical health and needs to be prioritized. This is emphasized by the amount of people who have been communicating about the lack of spaces recently. The RDCK and City of Nelson needs to prioritize these spaces now (to meet the current demand they are not meeting) and to plan for the future (the population is growing and this needs to be planned for). While doing this, the facilities need to stay affordable so people can actually afford to use them. This is so important for the health and happiness of our community.
100. User pay is a reality with regard to past and future generations
101. The fitness centre needs to be bigger to keep up with demands. It is far too small for how busy it gets.
102. Curling Rink is really important
103. Improvements and expansions are important and will need to be paid for of course. It just needs to be a balance of cost vs benefit, taxation vs user fees, grants vs loans to come up with the best case scenario.

104.	Private user groups such as Glacier Gymnastics and Umbrella Dance Academy who take up the civic space full time take away from the possibility of other sports and user groups using the space. Couldn't RDCK also share costs with the city to run and maintain the civic centre? Users come from outside City of Nelson and it could offset some of the costs.
105.	It would be great if the empty lot could be used to expand the NDCC parking or gym space
106.	The buildings need to be repaired and the city should have done a long time ago
107.	I am concerned about the potential loss of the indoor soccer facility. The facility is full and more space is needed.
108.	Don't be afraid to consider more regional facilities - I know people from Nelson will complain about driving 15-30 minutes, but the rest of the people in the RDCK already do this and we can make some changes if needed.
109.	I do not think we need more affordable housing in Nelson. We need more community amenities and healthy ways to support our current population that actively contributes to our community.
110.	Recognizing the needs for social housing in our community, please consider using the limited space in the rec campus for recreation facilities. There are other areas for housing but not always other spaces for rec facilities. Need to make use of the curling rink for multi purpose activities, or replace curling rink and indoor soccer with better multi-purpose facilities.
111.	The buildings and services implicated are important, affordable community hubs that are accessible to the majority of the population. These should be a priority to protect or replaced with similar services
112.	A curling rink is a very important part of the community it teaches youth a lifelong sport, it's a space that they can go afterschool and know they'll have fun. In the evenings it's a welcome break for couples to curl and for men and women to have fun. A curling rink brings in out of town teams and Nelson has the unique opportunity to bring back the mid-summer bonspiel. A curling rink can be the heart of a community. I hope that the city will bring back this sport.
113.	Bring the rink back
114.	Aging population, and growing needs of seniors should be considered. Small targetted Rec transit could be considered
115.	Daycare would be of great benefit
116.	An indoor tennis facility sharing space with pickleball would greatly compliment the outdoor facilities already in operation. Readily availble users.
117.	I think the city should prioritize improving and maintaining the facilities that it has, and making sure it has the means to continue to maintain these facilities. It is a shame to see the curling rink close due to insufficient maintenance. That being said, all of the local facilities are VERY well utilized and if there this space available for a recreation campus then this should take priority over social housing. Residents who pay taxes appreciate having well maintained facilities to use, and activities to keep our kids active and healthy
118.	I would like to see the Community embrace a Pickle Ball facility, as the health and wellness rewards are evident. It is a relatively cost effective, multi purpose facility that can be used by all age groups. It is a growing sport with income generating potential.
119.	We NEED housing.
120.	It would be nice to offer more activities for the older teens / young adults.
121.	Nelson District residents who pay for the facilities with higher taxes should not have to also pay higher admission fees. It should be like the library where people who aren't supporting the facility through taxes pay an additional membership fee to use the facilities.

122.	Folks who are from areas that pay taxes to the recreation facility should pay lower fees to access the recreation facility. Those not from a contributing area should pay higher fees. This was the case in the town where I grew up and other cities. You had to show valid ID within the area and you got a reduced punch card/monthly membership, etc. Similar to how areas that do not pay into the Library have to pay for their own library card. This proposal should consider the future of the library as that is a vital space to the community and is currently not large enough to support our community. If we gave attention to funding a larger library space there would be room for meeting rooms. A great example of what this space could be is Canmore's "Elevation Place". Alternatively retro fit the Fire Station and build an edition to house the Library. The fitness facilities are far too small for our population size and it is ridiculous that most space is taken up by areas dedicated to specific sports - when per square foot most people are using the fitness, aquatic areas and movie theatre. We're an active town and we are sardines in the weight room/fitness classes. Maybe the skating rink, soccer facilities, curling rink etc. need to be moved somewhere totally different because they require more space and parking? No one is showing up to hockey walking or on a bicycle. Please do not use grants to direct your roadmap - the city has proven they make poor choices when grants lead the way (boat coffin and food cyler programer). Make good longterm decisions.
123.	Please don't over-prioritize high maintenance curling ice over say a low maintenance running track, just because curlers are loud.
124.	The fitness centre needs to expanded. I do not want to pay for a 'world class facility' I do believe sport fatigues need to be adaptive to change in sport I do think some indoor facilities need to be more drop vs formal schedule
125.	I support the theatre society over the others - they are fundraising separately and maybe could be supported more as the building is leased by them.
126.	MAKE IT GREAT !!
127.	We need proper parking for this space. My businesses parking lot across the street is not an appropriate place to send people to park or to tell buss drivers from the hockey teams to park. Use the empty lots to build a parking structure and charge for parking. That will create revenue and allow for more residents to access the spaces. Please make the space accessible to everyone not just the handful of residents who walk or ride bikes. Seriously there are over 10k of us. Think about that when you think about how these spaces are used. In fact more people would consider using these spaces if there were proper parking.
128.	Nelson is growing, and so should the improvements to / further development of its recreation facilities. There is a correlation between the existence of recreation facilities in a community and the overall physical and mental health of its citizens.
129.	Nelson's recreation area seems old and a bit confusing, in that one doesn't even know things exist and where, such as indoor soccer, curling, etc, so consolidating them all better through rebuild or upgrades and connections would help create a wholistic and unified center, such as the hockey rink, pool, workout complex...modernisation

158.	Since 2020, it seems that the Nelson Recreation facility has been less responsive to the needs of the community. It seems to made decisions based on charging more fees and creating a need to preregister for class, and the computer system used for scheduling seems more dysfunctional that systems used in the private sector. Causing the fee structure to be a hassle for both the client and the staff. A remedy to that would be to take a look at what you are asking the client to do, and what is more normal in the private sector. For example usually if a private sector suggests that a client preregister for classes, there is a lower rate per class, because the money is paid up front. And usually drop in classes are the standard rate. Usually any punch pass has the ability to function like a monthly class for signing up for classes, but not at the Nelson facility, because the computer system can't seem to handle it. 251.	Incorporate much needed facilities such as affordable housing and childcare space.
252.	<p>One potential thought: if a new, large, modern indoor soccer facility were to be created, it could be a multipurpose venue: soccer, Frisbee, other indoor field sports (?). As a way to cover costs, once per month there could be an open event for for-profit groups to rent the space and pay into the "pot" to cover costs. 256.	Prefer to have transparency in cost to improve current civic recreation space vs the cost for removal and replacement prior to making these decisions.
257.	Offer a means-tested admission increase; have a special levy for raising the funds through property tax, so that the levy expires; we have incredibly talented athletes go through many of these programs - they need facilities to support their growth
258.	This is valuable as it is walking distance and my three kids can all walk there from school.
259.	If other area residents that are serviced by the campus amenities were paying into the service the costs would be shared more equitably, user fees would remain low and there would be less need to raise taxes so much. Share the burden over a broader region. It's great to explore partnerships and grants, but not at all cost. The partnerships and funding should be in alignment with the vision. Is exploring affordable housing on that site a reason to qualify for funding that can then be leveraged. Is that actually the best site to build housing - and a 6 story build at that? What makes it the right site? How will parking be addressed? Can more community meeting places or spontaneous use opportunities be built into the campus? Currently the vibe is very much all business - get in and get out - jockey for parking, and overcrowded spaces at the NDCC. There is a lack of community and health and wellness vibe. It can actually be quite activating to go there between circling the parking lot and then trying to get through the front desk to jockey for over crowded spaces. Our town seems to be outgrowing the core services that the NDCC is offering.
260.	there should be a whole RDCK regional tax setup to fund/setup a slush fund for all of these recreation buildings in all of the RDCK, not just in Castlegar or Nelson. If there is a need in a smaller community for something like this then the funds would be available for those communities and they would be able to have buildings like this and not be left out. There is no reason for everything to be centralized in Castlegar or Nelson.
261.	The space allotted to recreation in the city master plan should be used for recreation, not low income housing.
262.	Sports and rec isn't simply about personal health and wellness its about community building and rallying points for people to come together from diverse backgrounds to have conversations and make lasting connections. Sports bring all faiths, religions, economic backgrounds and ethnicities together under one roof. It helps protect against bias', fear mongering, racism and helps foster a peer relationship among community members to ensure a tighter bond between it's residents. It helps young people bond with older folks, helps teach 'the way' and show new members the positive aspects of participation. A central rec campus should be a core focus for nelson's city hall. The vast outdoors allow for heaps of activities and rec but the distances between people limit the quality and duration of contact between using members. Cyclists may say hi on the way by one another or catch up briefly at a junction but pales in comparison to team sports or club activities that bring people under one roof so to speak. Costs may be high to ensure this sort of facility is built and maintained but the intangibles such a complex brings to a community is worth far more than any possible incurred costs. People will move here because of it, stay here because of it, put up with more hassles and social issues because of it and remain a happier tax base because of it. I would also like to state that I support funding and building of facilities beyond only the sports I enjoy and support. It's important to see the bigger picture and not be only concerned for what directly is important to you as an individual. 275.	Re: previous question (question 15) " I think a project that supports an already thriving recreational community within Nelson (the Discover Circus community, specifically) to stay afloat should be given additional importance rating"because it's not the "idea" of the impact a recreational activity "could have", it's the reality of Discover Circus' impact that's already present that will be lost if they cannot secure an appropriate space. They have a proven track record of positively impacting people's lives, bringing money into the community through paid events and performances, and enriching the arts of the community (both children, and adults). They should be given additional importance consideration. They need help to stay afloat"they need a space. Discover Circus is already an established network of people, serving high quality classes and opportunities for creative growth as individuals, and in community. They have grown year on year, and they have the potential to really expand the number of people they serve (given the opportunity to secure appropriate space). The arts they train people in have the potention to continue bringing money into the community through events and performances, and bolster the Nelson creative arts scene even more than they already have. Without a space to continue, the circus school will die, and the larger Nelson community as a whole will suffer because of it. Discover Circus brings a unique and important opportunity for people to explore their creativity, strengthen their bodies, and connect with others. It would be a shame for it to be lost.

278.	Pickle ball is a very fast growing sport and the courts at Mary Hall, at the 10th street campus are not at all adequate. There is no evening availability.
279.	A phased approach should be considered so that no facilities or sport is shut down for extended times as a result of renovation or construction of next facilities.
280.	Remove the Curling club building and build a muti purpose facility such as: Squash Club, climbing gym, Basketball, Badminton, indoor soccer indoor, tennis etc. Move the climbing gym project to this location. Do not use the vacant lots at Cedar and Hall for housing keep that land for recreation
281.	I think we need to focus on upkeeping the facilities we have now. The City owned facilities are in fairly bad shape. I think the improvements to the facilities should be paid for more by the users of the facilities (e.g., clubs, and memberships) and less from City taxes. I think we should adopt a tiered fee structure, similar to the library, to ensure that RDCK residents not paying their fair share in taxes, pay more to use the facilities. Finally, I don't love the club model having exclusive use of public facilities. I would like to see them useable on a drop-in basis by the general public, at least for some time slots. Not having this facility would be a tremendous loss to the community, and I sincerely hope that the community of Nelson's love and commitment to the sport is considered when evaluating the need to maintain the facility.
296.	I think a public gymnasium is something that is seriously needed. Nelson keeps adding housing but doesn't match that these people have to use facilities in our town. We have more and more active seniors. The civic centre focus is on hockey and if there is no curling club that space should be for recreation. It is a perfect location obviously and it has such potential for multi use. I think it is very sad Nelson is losing the curling rink but if it is the case it would be detrimental to lose the rink to something that is not recreational. Indoor pickleball/tennis and a weight room along with a walking track would great in that space.
303.	There should be a review of the wages of the higher administrators. As for expansion; the province is using this facility as part of school curriculum i.e. credits then they should either fund their own gym or pay another floor to accommodate the children from the high school.

310.	Privatize it all. Let those who use it pay. Most of the population never uses these facilities, just a very very vocal minority (bullies) that wants everyone to pay for their toys. Play outside!
311.	I am proud of what is already available, and would support expansion.
312.	These questions are designed to pit sports organizations against each other in a competitive process. This is not proper planning to create a comprehensive vision for the future of S&R in Nelson. Your process is flawed.
313.	Access to The facility and programs should be made available free of charge to those who cannot afford admission fees.
314.	It is extremely important to have facilities for our children, elders and the community in general. If these type of indoor sports facilities are no longer available it will have a negative impact to the community as a whole.
315.	The costs of admission to recreational facilities need to remain accessible to ALL members of the community, not just those who can afford it.
316.	I'm appalled that you would consider raising taxes to deal with this mess you've created. Yes I'll pay your proposed increase in taxes, because I want to use the current facilities and want my kids to be able to use them. 319.	The Gym is very popular and gets pretty crowded. Could use an upgrade on equipment and space.
320.	We use the pool, fitness, hockey arenas, soccer fields. And we have amazing pools, fitness studios, and soccer fields. But al the people aged 7-85 playing pickle ball and tennis in the summer, filling up the camps and adult programs, could share an indoor courtâ€”a court that would require almost zero maintenance. 3 pickle courts would fit in a single tennis court. That's a lot of participants across all age groups who can benefit.
321.	I do not support funding the massive upgrades required to keep the Civic Arena and Nelson curling rink. We do not need two arenas in one town, especially when the pool and fitness facilities are always overflowing and there are a number of recreational activities that are not even offered yet. While I grew up curling and do love the sport, the next generations are really not embracing it. I would feel bad for all the old timers who will lose that activity but, at some point, the plug will need to be pulled. I also don't think we need to invest in an indoor soccer pitch. There are many sports that I play outdoors during the summer, and it is okay to let them go for the winter months. Badminton and rock climbing at Mary Hall are always extremely busy, often above capacity. Creating space on the community recreation campus for these activities is a much higher priority for me. As well, the one fitness room at the rec center could easily be expanded to two or three, it seems there are always competing interests for that room. Classes like Spin fill up immediately, it would be wonderful to be able to offer more of them. Additionally, having a daughter who is more into creative recreation, like dance, gymnastics and music, it would be great to see them prioritized as much as hockey. And on that note, can we please get the three smaller theaters built so the civic theater society can finally run in the black? Appreciate that you're fixing the roof there! And it would be amazing if there was space at the rec center for less sporty parents to hang out while their kids are in activities, with a few comfy chairs, etc. The two or three benches currently available are sparse and uncomfortable. I would also like to add that while I am clearly supportive of additional recreational spaces/opportunities, I am also supportive of housing being built on that site. I would be more supportive of affordable housing for very low income residents, like Nelson CARES provides rather than SHARE Nelson's "workforce housing" model which excludes anybody on income assistance or disability, which is our most vulnerable citizens. And, finally, you didn't ask about parking but I will still give my two cents. Every time I come into town for my spin class, I need to drive every row of the parking lot, sometimes several times, in order to find a parking spot. Are there any options for additional parking? Could the current lot become a parkade? Or is it a matter of better enforcement? Are people parking there all day who work downtown? Best of luck with making all of these hard decisions! You are never going to please everybody, but I hope you don't bow to pressure from the organizations who have the capacity to speak the loudest, like hockey and soccer.
322.	Where is SD 8 in this whole process? They have facilities that seem under-utilized and we pay taxes to that system? They need to be part of the solution.
323.	A space for live concerts, dance parties, or anything that requires loud sound would be incredible.
324.	The fitness Center needs an expansion soon very overcrowded at all times. Parking is the biggest issue at NDCC
325.	Upgrade the following. Gym, walls , gym equipment, lights, floor, windows, parking lot, smell of the gym, better speakers. Go to a city and look at their gyms and then look at out 2005 crap.
326.	There is a strong need for a performance and community gathering space in Nelson. The current spaces available are privately owned bars and clubs who's goal is profit, not supporting our thriving art and music community. A space where independent artists and promoters can put on events, not only support's current contributors to our community to share, collaborate and improve their art, but can open the door, connect and inspire future creators in, and from the area.

327.	The concept when the Civic Center was built in the '30s was to have a place for the community to get together, go to the library, play sports etc etc. It was a service provided to the people for the people and was paid for by taxation. It was never meant to be self supporting by user groups AND FEES. It WAS a CIVIC SERVICE. It has gone to a facilities for the rich high income families who "can afford" to pay the high user fees, from a facilities for all levels of income.
328.	Recreation in our community is very important. Let's focus on being able to consistently offer this to our community.
329.	Upkeep has to be done
330.	Adult user groups should pay what it costs with no taxpayer support. Their fees must be raised in order to take the burden off the general taxpayer. Kid sports should pay a subsidized rate.
331.	It's essential to our communal our kids wellness to keep these activities accessible. Especially soccer for our family. If these were not available we would likely move away from the area entirely
332.	The squash club is currently thriving but in a tenuous lease that makes the future of squash uncertain at best. There are over 100 members annually with two main tournaments that draw players from all over. Squash courts on the campus would ensure the sport can have a future in Nelson.
333.	I lived in Balfour and Harrop for 25 years and our family used almost all the facilities on the recreation campus. I don't understand why these communities don't pay their share in the cost of maintaining and developing these facilities.
334.	we are not your atm for every stupid idea council dreams up, do not raise property taxes for anything that is a luxury! The RDCK areas that are paying nothing should be charged more at area facilities, Nelson facilities that are only paid for by nelson residents should have different rates for non nelson residents and visitors. This city needs to learn how to make money that isn't raising property taxes because that is your solution for everything.
335.	Please offer reduced rates for people and families with lower income. Free passes for single parents or those who can't afford for their children to attend.
336.	More Pickleball please
337.	We need a climbing gym, it is the fastest growing sport in the world. All ages use it. Has potential to bring in revenue and people to our area by way of regional and provincial competitions.
338.	A second rink is required for the community of Nelson. Hockey is a sport that bring a unique and specific set of life skills to our children.
339.	I think recreation should take precedence over housing.
340.	Expansion of current recreation facilities, especially the fitness centre, due to volume of use, should be encouraged. Proper care and maintenance of the civic arena is also high priority.
341.	I think it would be awesome if there was little rentable pods just for overnight that is heated with a bed to be rented cheap so that homeless or very low income people would be able to stay warm especially in the winter.
342.	We need to make our recreation facilities multipurpose and well utilized. We need to expand the hours of use of our facilities and use them for the entire year. We need to have a broader tax base to fund these that reflects the larger user base.
343.	As Nelson and the surrounding area grows the recreation campus can be integral as a sports, culture and recreation area attracting professionals to our community such as doctors, nurses, teachers and other needed community members. We moved here because of the indoor and outdoor recreational activities. A second ice sheet in Nelson is very important to a lot of people in the community and should be kept as a priority.
344.	I don't want to pay more taxes for something our family very rarely uses.
345.	I am fundamentally in favour of upgrading and adding facilities. But at 78 with a 23 yeat old pension that has never kept up to inflation or has been indexed. I can not afford a penny more in taxes or increase for admission.

346.	The Nelson soccer community is growing rapidly and is a very real source of community for many people who might otherwise feel alone or unable to connect to the community in Nelson without a shared activity of soccer. I grew up in the soccer community and made some of my closest friends for life there, and as somebody who will be inheriting property in Nelson and possibly settling down here, I hope my children can have the same experience with updated facilities, as our current indoor space has been a series of putting band-aids on a building that requires greater intervention. With the size of the community and the eagerness of members to participate I believe it is time for an updated facility with the capacity to accommodate all who wish to participate.
347.	#NAME?
348.	Pickleball is a fast growing sport in Canada, North America and beyond. It will be an Olympic Sport in 2028. In Nelson winter/indoor membership has been capped because of lack of court space/time.
349.	Making sure there is enough space and facilities for our population. It isn't great that people can't subscribe their kids to swimming lessons or gymnastics, etc. because there is not enough room or facilities to offer these activities. Additionally, de-crowding the current facilities would help a lot. A lot of people, like myself, prefer paying more and use private gyms instead of dealing with the crowd at the NDCC fitness gym. Thanks!
350.	This is an excellent opportunity for Nelson to be approaching new discoveries in science too. My partner is currently undertaking neuromuscular and myofascial training through working with Sevrin Baker who has a clinic on Baker Street. Through the combination of this particular sound system and this psychosomatic training, he has been reversing years of neuromuscular and soft tissue dysfunction with the combination of music, the type of reverberating bass from the sound system and the training. With the bass, you're able to feel the position of your body in space better and therefore makes it easy for the person practicing to advance leaps in a single night with the music. He has been writing to researchers and people in the holistic health community about this phenomenon. It would be cutting edge to incorporate these two modalities to bring better health to the people of Nelson.
351.	Sports and recreation is incredibly important to the health of the community and can be an important economic driver. I don't play pickleball but would likely do so if there were more indoor facilities. I do NOT think that the recreation campus should be a location for more affordable housing: it should be prioritized for sports and recreation only.
352.	The curling facility is an important part of Nelson's history and a key player in its future. The potential of generating revenue outside of curling activities is great as well. Keeping the curling centre is a smart business decision.
353.	I would love to see a small cold dip pool added to the aquatic center. I think it would be beneficial and we'll use it. Everyone I talk to that uses the hot tub & sauna facilities there agrees they would like to see one added.
354.	I don't use that much for recreation but do know how valuable it is. My neighbor was an emergency doctor and left town because there wasn't enough amenities for his family
355.	Recreation is an extremely important part of healthy communities. We need to support this in the community, residents need healthy activities for kids and adults and as a community we should be supporting this wholeheartedly.
356.	A 4 sheet curling rink would be good for the community- and if it has a cement floor the space could be used for other purposes the half of the year when there's no curling rink- thus meeting summer program needs. Better public transit access is needed to make the recreation facilities more accessible - a bus that loops to the front doors of the complex
357.	A general use gymnasium would be a very good addition to the city & district
358.	Multi-use spaces that could be shared by a variety of users please!
359.	Without high quality facilities for recreation we are not an attractive city for newcomers who can afford to pay taxes and pay for these type of services. People will move to other places where services are available and we will be a less attractive place to live for existing residents as well. Children and young adults are an important part of our city and need places to be active and we all need access to services that support our health and wellness at all ages, not just those young adults in peak fitness levels. Yes there should be fees, but seniors should be able to access services at a lower cost due to their fixed income situations. I find the cost of the facilities too high to use on a regular basis which is not supporting my health or fitness. I assume others find this as well.

360.	Speaking as a parent to two competitive swimmers, the Kootenay Swim Club payer WAY higher lane and meet fees than any other swim club that we compete against. Close to double in most cases. This includes facilities operated by other regional districts. I'm not sure where the disconnect is but I see no reason why other facilities can operate for a drastically lower rate than the NDCC can. I'm guessing this disconnect holds true with ice time and other rental components as well. Many families are getting close to being priced out. Rental fees need to be addressed for certain or the vast majority of youth will not have the privilege of using our facilities and participating in recreational activities.
361.	Definitely a larger workout space. It gets quite crowded during high traffic times
362.	We must keep the curling rink! The city should be keeping their buildings in good repair, it's quite shameful. Recreation, whether we use it ourselves or not, is importance to all the people in the community. I no longer have young children but these facilities need to be there for them, as they were for my young family. I believe the parts of the RDCK not supporting these facilities need to contribute or pay higher fees when using the facilities. I also feel this survey is very biased, it only considers what I use now, not what I used in the past or what I'll use in the future.
363.	Keep and maintain what we have! Don't go chasing mythical monies based on mythical building budgets thst ALWAYS cost more than planned!
364.	Nelson is well known for its performing arts scene but the community recreation campus does not reflect this. The dance studio is exclusively available to one studio, which does not serve adults. There are 6 other dance studios screaming for space and access, all at the mercy of commercial landlords with no barriers to increasing rent. The circus community is being kicked out of their home of 10+ years. The performing arts and Nelson will die unless the community rec facility considers expanding space to accommodate the dance and multi purpose arts needs of the community. Intuit Movement Studio, a privately funded small business, invested over \$100k to upgrade its facility and expand to create more offerings at great detriment to the owner. Within a year of this investment the landlord increased rent by 15% and ownership has no recourse, bringing the long term viability of the business into question. Discover circus is being kicked out because it serves the landlords personal needs. They also have no recourse. The performing arts benefit our community economy and offer entertainment to our community. Losing these businesses will change the fabric of our community. Please consider adding more dance/ multi purpose spaces for the performing arts.
365.	Discover Circus and the squash club are losing their space in Oct 2025. Discover has long wait list now and could be providing more fitness activities to a larger group of people with access to a long term lease in a building, and expand services to people with disabilities if the new space was accessible. I would love to see a partnership happen with this not for profit.
366.	Nelson and area residents participate in a lot of recreational activities and it should be a priority to serve the community with a first class recreation facility. People seem to have money to ski, golf, curl (in other communities) etc. which are expensive recreational activities, so we should be able to fund facilities that only enhance those sports as well. The Civic Theatre raised a lot of money for enhancements, perhaps some huge fundraisers that support the community would help fund the facility.
367.	Your questions asked my opinion re: increase in property taxes. I am not a property owner. When designing surveys remember that 37% of us in Nelson are renters
368.	Not interested in housing grants to support the construction.
369.	It seems that we are lacking in size of a facility for indoor soccer. A full sized indoor soccer facility would serve many people and their families and would benefit the kids soccer programs. Current programs fill up quickly for adults and kids and a larger space would serve us well.
370.	I believe an indoor soccer facility with cafe run by youth players (like the outdoor fields) would benefit NSA by funding the nelson youth soccer.
371.	The community recreation campus should allow for a wide range of physical activities to happen in the area. Aerial arts and acrobatics has wide interest in Nelson and needs a space to practice their activities.

372.	Please consider user fees or private public investment to fund recreation projects. We have been taxed to death recently. Has the RDCK considered looking at their own "house" for trimming unnecessary costs which add to the tax burden of the community. For example the Balfour transfer station used to operate with one employee and now they have four employees. Often two employees are sitting in the pay booth together which seems to be a disregard for tax payer dollars. I am sure there are many other areas/departments that could easily streamline and cut costs. We simply can't keep going to the seemingly endless taxation pit.
373.	My wife was on the board of the NMHA for 13 years and organized over 10 tournaments , bringing in teams from many areas and providing the local economy with hotel bookings, restaurant usage, and shopping for the many teams coming from non local areas. Having 2 arenas was an integral part in getting teams to come here, as ice times were better and teams liked that the 2 arenas were located together. I believe it is important not to lose this facility. My children used the gymnastics club and the theatre many time growing up. Losing this facility would just send people to other centers to use theirs.
374.	I would not like to see any further additions of ice rinks. In square footage and cost, we have so much money going to the ice rink and relatively little to the fitness Studios and no gym. We really need a public gymnasium as part of this complex. Otherwise groups have to rely on Mary Hall or school gymnasium's for sports. I would also like to see a small portion for Discover Circus. They have an amazing program and are in need of space to continue.
375.	Community recreation and green space are high priorities for me.
376.	The recreational facility property should not be used for affordable housing.
377.	As long as its run/built correctly and not overinflated because it is being done by the government it could be a great idea. Often it seems these tax funded projects blow budgets and deadlines.
378.	I would like to see current, viable facilities brought up to date before considering additional facilities
379.	There is a lack of event space for live shows and accessably priced venues to host community events. There is a need for a venue that can be loud and not disturb neighbors, ehich allows the community to gather, and be accessible in price to the arts and culture of the community.
380.	I realized I had done this survey a couple weeks ago
381.	All areas need to pay for the service or the pay higher rates to use it. It's not fair some residents pay higher rates yet other people pay nothing an gain the same ability for the same costs. Not everyone can afford to own a car or live out of city limits but your punishing them by making them pay for services that locals use but since th. Live 20 minutes away they pay no money towards the service
382.	I really didn't understand the last few questions I do want to say making affordable housing units that includes some complex care housing is my most important priority for this city. I lovee the
383.	Keep it as affordable as possible for families of our youth.
384.	I feel the most important thing to do is build affordable housing on the empty lot. Please consider the recent housing assessment done this fall, which reflected the desperate need for affordable housing in Nelson. As well, we have one of the highest rates of homelessness, and this would help to get people housed. It is incumbent on the city and RDCK to help to implement the recommendations of the Federal Advocate on Housing and take swift action to house people without delay. This I feel should be a priority. 385.	Please dont make the leisure access program inaccessible or reduce its current potential to afford people accessibility. I and other disabled people rely heavily on the subsidy and im worried the new program will make basic fitness and physical health unaffordable to me if the subsidy works out to be smaller than 50% entry fee over a year.
386.	do you have any suggestions on how to support local artists who currently do not have a space to showcase? are there venues available that we could locate a list of places that could be available?
387.	curling is not a priority.
388.	There needs to be more space allocated to fitness areas and fitness classes. A basketball court added to the existing fitness center for muliple use.

389.	Too expensive. You idiots can never get your shit together and you are tone deaf. Our taxes are already too high, never mind all the other expenses living here.
390.	Parents are waiting , at the pool, at the arena , at the gym, and there's no way for them to participate at the same time as their kids. Why not open a swim lap for the parents ? A swimming lesson ? It's a captive audience â€¦!
391.	I hope local politicians lean heavily on the the good of sports on the community. Also, I believe the sporting demographics have changed in this country, whereas Hockey used to be the sport with the most participation and it has been heavily funded. It is now sports like soccer, gymnastics and biking. They need to become the new priority.
392.	Offering a multitude of sports and recreation to youth and adults is essential to physical and mental health. Sports and recreation offer a safe place for people to build connections and friendships and result in stronger communities. There will also be the benefit of and less spending on healthcare down the road.
393.	There is a current push towards large event spaces hosting EDM music events. I dont think public spaces should be used to host these events such as the curling rink UNLESS it can be assured that they are drug free events. There is so much drug use. Tired of it.
394.	Hello, I am a regular gym user but have been deterred due to the congestion of the NDCC weight room. The congregation only got worse when they decided to close off the fitness class room so you can no longer do circuits or stretch in there. Another level for the gym or an expansion is what I am advocating for.
395.	Expand the facilities that are maxed out with users like the gym. Parking is an issue at the NDCC. It would be nice to have some kind of enforcement with regards to people who park in the parking lot and do not use the facilities.
396.	kids and family needs should take priority.
397.	I would love to see expanded open gym space and more machines and space to do workouts.
398.	We really need low to moderate income housing for the people that live and work here. We have had a lot of development for higher income people but those of use barely making a living wage or less are no longer able to live here. Yes we need to have recreation facilities but we also need housing support. It would be amazing to see a combo effort between the city and the RDCK.
399.	I do not believe housing should be prioritized for the current lot.
400.	This is an opportunity to show that the RDCK and City of Nelson are leaders in our community and committed to RECREATION. To sacrifice recreational resources for housing would be an affront to the health, both physical and mental, of our youth and adults who rely on this central hub for recreation. The community is full of experts and resources that could come together to find more suitable places for housing and this is a block that was meant for recreation.
401.	I use to use the pool and gym more but I will use less now that I cant buy a ten or 20 punch pass and not risk losing things i paid for. I work away and could be gone 6 months with little notice (work in film) so I loose my passes because of that STUPID rule instituted by the RDCK!! Also don't even think of raising nelson taxes to pay for luxuries, this town thinks we are its personal ATMs and it must stop. This town robs in citizen every chance its gets.
402.	I am very opposed to using public recreation space for housing of any sort. Personally, I am under-housed and very affected by the housing crisis, but I do not believe that using up scarce recreation space to provide subsidized housing is the answer. We need to protect these common spaces for common use and enjoyment. City planners are touting BC Housing funding as a reason to proceed with developing the empty lots for housing. The promise of some "free" money to develop housing is a short term solution that we will have to live with permanently. Once the housing has been built, we will never be rid of it. One of the great things about the NDCC is the availability of parking. There is almost no parking downtown these days, so being able to find a spot in the parking lot greatly increases accessibility to the CRC. We may one day live in a post-car world, but we are not there yet. In the meantime, it's nice to be able to park. I am very disappointed in the poor job of upkeep of CRC assets. The talk of the curling rink being demolished is very upsetting and it is ridiculous that a city of our size has nowhere to curl. I have also heard that the indoor soccer arena is in need of some serious maintenance. The civic centre and arena are likewise in need of major repairs. If the city is wondering what fancy new facility

to add, I would suggest instead budgeting for a maintenance fund that could pay for upkeep on existing buildings.

405.	Affordable and supportive housing should be paramount to this community
406.	This was an awkwardly structured and disorienting survey which may lead to confusing and unreliable results. In my opinion the City has done an amazing job operating a poorly constructed and cobbled together campus with extremely poor performing buildings from an energy usage standpoint. Extending hours of operations should be considered to reflect the growing diversity of users schedules and would offset peak overloading. Parking is also a growing problem given the districts growing population. In my opinion as an Area F resident, I would like to see all of Area E paying a portion of their public tax dollars to the facility as well.
407.	We need a bigger exercise c were then one we have is too small for the amount is serving
408.	Kids need to be the priority and ALL kids. Balance with soccer, hockey, and other sports. These organized sports are so beneficial to our communities!
409.	Not more housing / services
410.	It has been fantastic to see the large increase in the number of users at the NDCC fitness centre over the last few years. Unfortunately there is not enough space available to safely accommodate the number of people now using the fitness centre. Increasing the size of the fitness centre, including the amount of open, free space available, should be a priority.
411.	Nelson has enough social housing, what is desperately needed is affordable market housing.
412.	Thoughtful assessment of the needs of the community now and in the future.
413.	This survey should have a section about satisfaction with the facilities. I don't currently live in Nelson but I visit regularly and use the NDCC facilities when I'm here. After using gyms in other communities you realize how grossly inadequate the NDCC is. It is small, cramped, and the equipment is decrepit. Some days the gym is so packed that I wonder if it is exceeding fire regulations. I won't even use the pool anymore because the change rooms are tiny and disgusting. I can't stress how inadequate it is compared to facilities in other communities. Another problem is the hours of operation. I've never been to a gym where is seems like the hours are based on the needs of the employees rather than the customers. I've been told that the hours are so short on days like Boxing Day (outrageously busy) because the employees are getting time-and-a-half and the RDCK can't afford to keep it open longer. I don't want to be disrespectful when I say this, but I think the RDCK needs to think about whether a job checking people in at a gym should be paid as high as it is. Usually jobs like that are starter jobs for kids just out of high school or in college. They're not career jobs where people are in them for 20 years. I'm sorry to say this, but if the facility is unaffordable and improvements can't be made due to high wages then that should be the number one place that is cut.
414.	This is a good idea. Nelson desperately needs more affordable housing, too. Things that make our community more accessible and involved are always a plus

421.	Don't try and cheap out on a new building. Build it for the future. Build it big and with lots of potential.
422.	Nelson has limited space to expand or build a new facility and if they built on the existing site there would be a long closure time to our facility to rebuild which is not desirable. Parking is already difficult at peak times. I really only know about the fitness centre for the most part as we use that the most and time our visits for low usage times.
423.	Please consider including the Lakeside Park boat rental facility as part of the campus. I use it a lot in summer along with children's recreational groups, other citizens as well as tourists. It is an important recreational facility organized through the Community Recreation Campus. Somehow it has been missed in your survey.
424.	Maintain your low income option for community members who can't afford to access. If you maintain the low income pass option, then I think slightly increasing passes and drop-in by \$1-5 is fine.
425.	We have new builds within our city sitting empty, and many more being built and not purchased yet. The community needs a sport complex for all sports to keep our kids off the streets and active. I believe a sporting complex should be the only plan, either upgraded or built new over affordable housing. How about when the city approves a new building to go up they designate a percentage to lower income families and maybe the new builds won't sit empty or turn into private Air B and B's. 426.	Pickleball has become a very popular sport in Nelson. There are not enough indoor facilities, so beginners have no opportunity to join, as the existing rental at Mary Hall is only for intermediate and advanced players

433.	Area 8 should be supportive housing for those folks with special needs or living with a disability
434.	Expand the gym and get more than one of all equipment
435.	Combine any new builds with affordable housing or space for community wellness programs
436.	I really appreciate the NDCC's facilities, but I get frustrated by some of the systems used in it's operation (how passes are managed, wait times to get in, signing up for classes).
437.	The NDCC fitness centre needs an expansion in the worst way. Many times it is full to capacity and then some which goes against the fire code for one. Another is a person can't get on a machine for the fact that there are too many people waiting for the same machine. Had to leave at times because too many people for such a small facility
438.	The gym/weight room area is grossly inadequate. It needs an expansion. The change rooms are woefully inadequate. The curling club has a dwindling number of members, consider expanding into that space. Remove parking designated for 'curling club members only'. 444.	Other small towns have been successful in having a multi-sport dome help meet the recreational needs and interests of their communities. I'm curious if this has been fully explored as an option. Determining the time allocation for different sports/groups, also curious if this has been reviewed through an EDI lens to ensure groups have equal access to times/planning discussions and that it's not always just based on what has been done in the past.

It is especially important as this is one of the few sports that seniors can continue to play in order to stay active.

465.	I lived in Whitehorse for a year, and the Canada Games Centre there is an amazing facility. The indoor gym (sprung floor) and fieldhouse (artificial turf) were heavily used, and is one area that is lacking in Nelson. The fieldhouses are multi-sport, multi-age, with a running track around the top. More space for pickleball please!
466.	Our community needs more healthy options for kids. If we let the facilities they utilize disintegrate or fold we are creating kids that are bored, that will turn to trouble instead of sport. More activities and amenities should be made an available to them to keep them from turning to alcohol and drugs for entertainment. This will also strengthen our community. We need to be long term planning. Our rec facilities are NOT a place for more housing. That is an incredibly short sighted thought process.

467.	The complex should be designed with all age groups, abilities and users equally. With our aging population, more thought for better health and fitness needs to be a priority, as well as those with diverse needs who are often left out or not considered when recreation needs are designed. Affordability must be flexible to allow ALL to be able to utilize the facility.
468.	We need a bigger fitness center. The gym is too small for the amount of people that use it to work out and Nelson does not have another adequate gym to compensate
469.	I'd like to see the City and the RDCK manage recreation funds better and be proactive in putting funds aside for repairs and future facility repair needs. Money has been taken from the recreational facilities that has been paid by taxpayers for the purpose of operating and MAINTAINING these facilities to be applied to other projects and we are now in this mess because of it. A prudent local government would know that facilities need upkeep and repairs and instead they have turned and keep turning a blind eye until we are in dire straights. All of this nonsense with the Civic Arena could have been avoided if funds were handled correctly.
470.	extremely important to provide recreational and sports opportunities, especially to youth, so that they are engaged in their communities as a life style resulting in a healthier more productive longer lives.
471.	Please consider whether the addition of more facilities at the recreation campus can support the increased need for parking. The current campus does not provide enough parking during the winter when hockey is going, swimming and people using the fitness centre. The parking lot is a nightmare. And unfortunately the activities there are not conducive to walking or public transit. Adding more activities without providing parking would be disastrous
472.	The importance questions are all so subjective as to be meaningless for example what is beneficial to the community for me will be very different to others.
473.	Water parks and other outdoor amenities for young children are very important to keep them active and healthy. Family-centric sports are important to allow families of all income levels to have fun. Curling and water sports and other indoor sports are also community building for all ages with our long, dark winters
474.	More reasonably priced opportunities for active seniors- hiking groups, art classes, pickleball, learn to skate for adults, etc. The womens change room should have more private changing stalls!!!!!! Consider adding a gender neutral change room with individual shower rooms with doors/ locks (ie Mission rec ctr). Digitize checkin for registered members. allow multiple checkin kiosks for classes/ activities without waiting in staff lines.
475.	Consider the recreational needs of an aging population
476.	We need to consider what we can provide at a reasonable cost to the youth of our community to give them healthy options.
477.	Good recreation facilities are vital for the health of our kids and their future. sports and physical activities encourage healthy living and help kids grow and develop in important ways that can play a big part in the people they become as adults.
478.	Think critically about activities that need to be accessible by public transit/walking (ie central) and those that could be relocated due to personal vehicle use. Cost sharing and grant sharing with new library facility would make a lot of sense if the City and District are thinking wisely about future resource planning and funding allocations.
479.	The campus needs to accommodate the changing demographics while maintaining facilities for young families. We have been here for over 30 years and raised a family here. Our kids used the pool and indoor soccer facilities. Us parents used the indoor soccer facilities. We appreciated having an indoor space where we could run around in the winter months. I think having a space that adults can enjoy and exercise in during cooler months is really important in the Kootenays.
480.	Nelson is a growing community that lacks resources at the ndcc providing more fitness services and recreation can make our community more healthy and allow everyone to partake in a non crowded environment. Nelson is also an expensive place to live and our amenities should show accommodate high taxes and government grants.

481.	I realize there is a cost to operating these facilities however, the benefit to the community members overall health and fitness and very hard to track and should be considered in the overall plan. Drop in co-ed hockey fees have gone up a lot in the last 5 years, an example of an activity that should not be based on making a profit or even covering costs necessarily because it has such a community benefit (many adults start playing hockey at that ice time, its a great learning opportunity). Parking is super challenging at the NDCC. I would love to see some enforcement on vehicles parked there actually using the facilities. Everyday I see MANY people park there and walk away to other businesses. Maybe random bylaw visits throughout the month could help. Perhaps fees should be structured to remain lower cost for community members, and a bit higher for tourists or visitors. Every winter the ski bums take a toll on the aquatic center! Its gets super busy, lots of people using it as their only shower and the messy state of the change rooms show how busy it is and how staff can't keep up with the increased seasonal demand.
482.	i believe this space is extremely important to the community. whatever it takes to demo and build or just update this complex only helps to create a better Nelson. also, i don't believe so much weight should be placed on the amount people who utilize the complex for a certain actively as much as the ability for the space to be flexible to meet the various clubs/groups needs.
483.	Nelson Cares should be paying taxes rather than burdening city residents with higher taxation to pay for their building. Partnering with them is laughable considering the financial drain they create while contributing nothing.
484.	I don't think that expanded recreational facilities are necessary. The facilities and programs that are currently available at both the Nelson and RDCK owned buildings seem adequate. However, the current facilities appear to need a lot of maintenance, so money should be focused on proactive maintenance of the current facilities rather than expanding the recreational facilities or introducing new activities. Prove to the taxpayer that the government can actually manage/maintain what we currently have rather than use public funds to build new recreational facilities.
485.	RDCK residents should be contributing equally to City of Nelson residents. Otherwise should pay a higher fee for admission.
486.	Keeping sport and recreation safe and centralized should be the highest priority for our children. There should be zero consideration given to housing for low income or homeless on the campus location. Keep that area safe for our children.
487.	Return curling
488.	This survey felt very primed to try to make this seem like a plan to expand the offerings for the recreation campus. Although this is important to think about, the bigger concern is ensuring that existing services and programs are actually able to function and operate into the future. Focus resources and time towards ensuring the theatre, soccer, curling, and other facilities within the city owned civic complex can operate without large extended closures. Once that work is done and paid for, then would be the time to start looking at future options to expand facilities.
489.	The recreation campus would benefit from taking into consideration the changing needs of this community and consequently the recreation interests that are also changing. We need to look at the broad scope of recreation and specifically what that looks like in our community - for example - our very active circus and dance communities, the growing basketball and volleyball demand and rollerskating/rollerderby. Creating more multi-use, flexible spaces will support collaboration between the many users and activities in our community and allow for better use of the limited footprint that the recreation campus has in the city. The City of Nelson and the RDCK need to start working together in partnership with the community at front of mind for any progress to be made.
490.	We need to service the needs of our ever growing community.
491.	I think spaces for activities which build community should be actively prioritised, e.g. indoor volleyball brings together a lot of people across genders, demographics and age groups (from high school to 50s)
492.	As smoky summers and low-snow winters increase, opportunities for indoor recreation are going to be more important than ever in the coming decades.
493.	The weight area is swarmed with youth. There needs to be a youth specific work out area or another weight room that has a max capacity.
494.	Curling rink would be a hit

495.	The current facility is overcrowded and requires expansion. Its necessity is fundamental to the needs of all ages in the community and needs to be expanded for the benefit of seniors as well as all age groups. It also has to remain affordable as rates have already been raised excessively.
496.	Parking and transport is brutal at present. Let's plan for a good facility in 50 years from now. The one we have is so short sighted and we have already outgrown it. Let's go big and make it amazing. Big pool! Big rink! Lots of work out rooms. A bus!
497.	The NDCC fitness facility is not large enough to service the population. It is extremely busy and could use some new equipment. I work in fitness/health so the business is inconvenient for me but for older populations and those less familiar with fitness it can be a deterrent. I joined the squash club to have access to racket sports but its honestly unaffordable...having some kind of racket sport access through the NDCC would be amazing (badminton, tennis, pickle ball) and there is no fun/ alternative gym space like a ninja or parcours space... This would provide value to those visiting as well.
498.	The existing facilities should be repaired or replaced. For example curling, that is very integral to small communities. A new multipurpose facility should be built.
499.	It does not need any improvement it is adequate use any funding for low income housing
500.	With the increase of an older demographic building a pickleball facility would increase the health and wellbeing of its aging population. This would lower the drain on medical services, health care costs and social services for the elderly.
501.	I didn't really understand the format of those last questions but wanted to make sure it is understood that I value the availability of these facilities and feel they should be a high priority to keep. I would like to see the current building fixed as opposed to a New facility if it makes sense financially to do so.
502.	We have great facilities but they require expensive maintenance; this should be accounted for in future development decisions.
503.	The consideration of ongoing maintenance needs to be considered. It is frustrating when city owned buildings do not factor in maintaining them or it feels that way and then it gets to this point where buildings are considered unusable.
504.	The historical significance of the civic centre should also be considered. There is value in maintaining this building from a cultural point of view as well as for recreational purposes.
505.	I do not want housing built in or around the recreation space. If green space is developed, it should be to accommodate a bigger fitness facility. The adults in our home are active but we value sports opportunities for our children, in order to keep them busy, learning discipline, developing resilience, and away from drugs.
506.	I think you're all in for a lot of complaints, especially because of the private stuff happening at the golf course. I think MORE funding for Salmo and other areas is important before Nelson gets all new shiny things- but you have to keep up with the money moving in. Good luck. Lovely project.
507.	THE PARKING LOT AT NDCC IS LETHAL, ESPECIALLY FOR CHILDREN - NO SPEED LIMIT, NO CROSSWALKS, NO POSTED ONE-WAY SIGNS
508.	It's difficult to anticipate the demand for new facilities and therefore also difficult to judge whether a new facility should have priority over improvements to an existing facility. This is especially true without details on the existing facility improvements, grant availability, etc. I think that these decisions should be made by the folks with all that knowledge at hand and not by the public.
509.	Would be great to expand the gym and have space for more equipment. Pretty small space for how many people use it and having to wait for machines gets pretty old
510.	reinstatement of the level of studio classes available for drop in to pre-covid service levels
511.	ideally the recreation campus sole purpose is recreation and community access. The calgary olympic park is a good model to show how infrastructure development promotes involvement in activity. We shouldn't become distracted by concerns of housing access, that is another topic all together. Keep recreation planning centred on recreation.
512.	NO MORE TAX INCREASES

513.	A recreation campus is central to the community and attracts needed professionals (nurses/doctors etc.). This space keeps a community healthy and connected (especially during the cold winter months). The priority should be recreation in the current recreation campus, not housing. This land is needed for recreation exclusively. If housing was used within this space, an additional recreation facility in another location needs to be planned for. We need to think beyond the one recreation campus. There should be a secondary facility which could have an indoor track, second ice rink, racket sports (tennis/pickleball/squash/badminton), indoor soccer, gymnastics, basketball court. If there were two campuses, the current space could also have the library, arts (theatre) add a playground and green space, expand fitness and add housing. This space could be more of a community space. If an additional rec space is not developed, the current land should be 100% dedicated to recreation. If housing takes the already limited recreation space it will impact the city significantly. Recreation space will be lost and never regained. If we do not think bigger in regard to recreation space, I feel health professionals and other needed taxpayers will start moving away and the overall health (mental and physical) will be compromised.
514.	I would pay higher fees for entry and rentals, but please keep an affordable option for people who can't. Make it really easy for people to ask for too. I don't want people having to prove they are below income cutoff or do an big application to get a lower cost entry fee.
515.	Parking at NDCC should be monitored and cars parked by non-facility users should be towed.
516.	-High need for community indoor gym space to accommodate hoop and net sports that don't have their own facility. -To accommodate growing population, please consider longer hours at community campus facilities. -Please consider that many indoor artificial turfs break down into carcinogens and microplastics.
517.	Thank you for your service The only Circus community in town just found out their lease will not be renewed and there is no other space with high enough ceilings to work in
518.	Many older individuals and youth curl and the curling facility has not been available for the past two years or more. This means only those people who are willing and able must travel to Castlegar and Trail to curl. This is of great detriment to older individuals who want and need to stay active and fit during the winter time, a season where there are not a lot of available activities for older people to participate in that is close to home, provides camaraderie and includes teaching and mentoring young individuals to become excellent curlers. The curling rink has been open for over 100 years prior and it is imperative for above stated reasons that curling continue in the community of Nelson. BTW I am not a curler, however I am a nurse and see the detriment of reducing variety of physical activity for older people. Furthermore, my son was learning and being mentored by the generous leaders at the curling rink but has not been curling due to not wanting to travel to Castlegar just to practice. When the curling rink was open, this young team with older mentor was on the way to achieving great successes, and had won a few tournaments in the process. It was deeply disappointing when the curling rink closed down, and especially when it seemed there was not a lot of support from the City of Nelson to financially facilitate its reopening. Curling has been apart of Nelson since its inception and I believe it should be apart of Nelson once again.
519.	Maybe it's time we start to think like entrepreneurs with a business mindset as what we are doing now dosent work.
520.	Listen the RDCK is a bloated fish. They could bring down costs and save money if they got rid of the redundant managers and staff. I'm sure if an internal audit was done I bet you could cut 50 percent of management there. On the facility or community complex you guys need to think about your staff and there quality of life. Split scheduling and unrealistic non full time schedules screw with the quality hugely trained people you wanna keep working there. I can't stress this Enogh the RDCK wastes more time and money trying to make decisions to many managers to go back and forth with than getting things done in a timely smooth manner.. 521.	The fitness training area is much too small and inadequately equipped. More weight training equipment is needed. The men's change area is completely inadequate. Showers in the fitness area are needed.a room dedicated to flexibility tracing is highly desirable.

522.	It seems obvious when looking at the taxation schedule that if you have an address that is in Nelson or area F that pays taxes on the facilities, the drop in fees/rentals should be lower than those residents who are from area E (who do not pay any taxes towards the facilities). Also, there should be a focus on non-elitist sports (affordable ones) and activities for kids/teens who do not do not play team sports. An art and Pottery studio would be very welcome!
523.	We need a martini bar in the pool. A bigger whirlpool with different seat levels. A more comfortable steam room.
524.	Consider aging population, people with disabilities, an adult lift needs to be added to the ndcc change room for wheel chair immobile people to get in pool, creating inclusive indigenous informed spaces
525.	Create spaces that are flexible and can serve multiple users groups. Expand the concept of recreation beyond sports to include leisure and cultural activities and create spaces in the campus to accommodate those activities. Flexible studio spaces and enhanced fitness and wellness related spaces should be prioritized over those for designated sport groups. Don't base recreation investments on nostalgia, think of usage trends and what the community needs in the future. Convert the Civic arena to an indoor multi purpose artificial soccer pitch
526.	The demographics of the community will change a lot over the next 20 years as we have both an aging retired population AND a baby boom with a bit of a gap in the peak working age population. I think it's important to make capital decision with input from the community, but bearing in mind how that input will be represented 10 years from now when the returns (in the form of vibrant high utilization community resources) from the capital investment are being paid.
527.	As a local resident and lower income of a family of 4 children, the current costs of admission does not allow regular access to the current facilities for our family. Even if the recreation campus was updated, sadly we wouldn't be able to afford to come regularly unless regular admissions went down or there was a reduced rate for large families and or local residents reduced rate since we pay taxes. How come the library has free membership with proof of address, but we do not have the same access to healthy recreation facilities? Discover Circus is losing their location within the year and are urgently needing a space that requires high ceilings and special rigging points. It would hurt Nelson's art culture to lose such an amazing artistic sport that has gained much popularity since we joined over 4 years ago. Providing a space for children and adults to experience circus arts would be truly exceptional. This space could also possibly double as a small performance space for other dance and music arts also. Kyokushin karate is also an amazing sport, they are currently renting the basement of a church and are looking for a space for a Dojo. A space for martial arts with the correct mats would be a blessing also. Climbing has been an important part of my children's upbringing, as they aren't into team sports. Please ensure the future fitness centre has a large dedicated stretching and warm up area. A space for heavy bags would be much appreciated also.
528.	Nelson needs this. It's very important and sports and recreational facilities that accommodate all ages is EXTREMELY important and needed. We are a healthy community and have a wonderful place to call home
529.	We need to eliminate the vending machines, and provide a small non-perishable table of snacks, and the \$ goes back into the recreation center, or helps support fundraisers.
530.	Arena Space, make more multi user friendly as they tend to sit empty for half the year. I feel Campbell field could be utilized. Nelson users along with area E,F, I and Castlegar could combined resources as both communities seem to not have enough users to justify a second ice facility but combined use might work. Also a gymnasium space is limited. If a gymnasium can not be built potential the RDCK could partner with the school districts and allow more access. Time tends to be restricted at these facilities. Currently gymnastics takes up all the space of the civic gymnasium at the civic. As this is a private business I don't feel this benefits the greater community. Would love to see them charged the market rate instead of the nelson tax base taking on the cost or make the space available to more user groups as it seem to sit empty most of the day. Ie circus
531.	The fitness centre is almost too busy to use and is way too small for the amount of people it serves. I don't know how the place could be losing money with the amount of usage. And you don't need that many employees doing nothing.

532.	Pool is overcrowded and has no natural light. Add some windows onto front street side at minimum.
533.	New climbing gym!! A new space for discover circus. indoor soccer is important! Ice skating is important!! a community gym and pool.
534.	Recreational that is accessible to ALL is very important for a healthy community. Green spaces and parks are also important. Kids do not get the same access to programs as they used to so we really need make sure that these services are offered. The cost of these services should be based on your income.
535.	Nelsons uniquely engaged sporting community is one of the things that makes this City truly unique. Facilities being available to youth as well as the community at large is essential for continuation of what is one of the most positive aspects of the city.
536.	Consider addressing future recreation needs as an investment not a cost. Important for future generations not just us old folks. A Multi use facility to be used on a rotational basis makes sense.
537.	NDCC needs a larger weightroom with more squat racks. Basketball/volleyball gym with regular open gym times in the evening and more times for community teams and leagues.
538.	Please do not close any centres, they are vital to our family. Thank you.
539.	Nelson has a long winter and with a growing population, many of which have not yards or small footprints, means that more people are using the facilities we already have. Nelson need to put money into allowing people to stay active for a reasonable amount of money (admission) this is what keep a community healthy and happy!
540.	please work with the nelson curling club to find them another home since the city owned property they were in is not usable anymore.
541.	I would love to see community input on the vacant city owned and RDCK owned lots adjacent to the NDCC. That would be a lovely spot for a fenced playground, especially with the existing tree cover. When my kids were younger I really appreciated the drop in childcare available at the NDCC, and it was the only thing that made me start using the facilities as a young parent. I know many families would like to see that return, and a playground on that lot would be a great space for child minders to take kids outside.
542.	The existing NDCC facility has been expanded over the years but it still does not meet the community needs and is very well utilized in the region. It needs a better reception area with controlled access, more office space, more multi-purpose spaces, common area for people to wait and socialize, better access to healthy food/cafe, expanded pool lap lanes, revamped pool change rooms to the modern standard as universal change room is too small, improved parking as it gets out of control during busy times and better parking patrol as City of Nelson Bylaw does not seem to spend enough time monitoring the parking lot or it gets busy after bylaw working hours.
543.	I'm all for spending extra tax dollars if they're not wasted. I find the top heavy waste of dollars spent at both the city of Nelson and the rdck as red flag that it might not be possible to do without wasting time and money
544.	Upgrading of infrastructure is essential. Increased funding needed for NDCC to hire more instructors and expand the weight room. The curling rink needs to be resored
545.	I am very much in support of a combined affordable housing/recreation building on the property. I also would like to see expanded childcare in the facility. I also think our youth soccer program deserves a better facility.
546.	The benefits that organised team sports bring to the community are immense. Both in terms of bringing the community together and providing meaning and joy. We personally chose Nelson as a place to live based on the strength of the swimming, soccer and gymnastics community relative to other towns that have similar outdoor assets (Revelstoke, Fernie, Rossland). Losing the indoor soccer facility or gymnastics or the 2nd hockey rink would devastate significant portions of the community and lead to an exodus of the kinds of people that make Nelson the lovely vibrant place it is today.

547.	The civic centre is used by the larger district and should be supported by taxation from the larger district. The current taxation structure is unfair and unsustainable. The entire space is community property and should be made available for use by the larger community and not just single interest or private groups. The taxpayer should not be supporting private business. The gymnastics club needs it's own purpose built facility. Local Government could support them in applying for funding to build one. The gymnastics club could team with Destination Circus which has an enrollment of over 300 people. The vacant lots need to be reserved for future recreation needs as our population continues to grow and densify. We do not need 2 ice surfaces when there are 2 more within a 50 km radius. Recreation facilities need to be flexible in their design and usage to accommodate changing needs in sport, arts, leisure activities and to serve a broad range of ages and abilities. When one group dominates usage it excludes other activities. Look at the current management structure and improve it to better plan, maintain and meet the needs of the community.
548.	Having 2 hockey rinks and a larger indoor soccer field are super important to my family!
549.	A city the size of Nelson should have a new updated facility that includes curling. Just look at Creston and what that beautiful facility brings to its community.
550.	The future of the Community Recreation Campus should prioritize providing safe, inclusive, and accessible recreational opportunities for all age groups in our growing community. As the population expands, it's critical to offer upgraded facilities and programs that promote physical and mental well-being, encourage community engagement, and support a healthy lifestyle for youth, adults, and seniors alike. A key area for improvement is the enhancement of our hockey and indoor soccer arenas. Upgraded arenas will not only accommodate the increasing demand for ice time and field usage but also attract regional events, fostering community pride and economic growth. 553.	1. Get the current structures open/operating as soon as possible. 2. Consider returning curling to its previous building/location and using the 1975 structure as a multi-purpose flexible space for soccer, pickleball, etc
554.	i think looking for a reason to develop and raise our taxes is an idiotic thing to do in a town whose infrastructure needs revamping . we need street lights and road upgrades, not more recreation

563.	I hate to think that there is any motivation or allocation of funds for beautification/modernization other than what is required for safety, building code, etc. I love the heritage feel of Nelson's facilities' and that they are not 'showy' or modern. We just need safe facilities that are accessible and get the job done, no expensive upgrades that are just to make them look newer or fancier.
564.	I found the questions in Section D unclear. I feel that results will not indicate the wishes of the community as the questions are poorly worded. Section D should be re-done.
565.	If something like indoor tennis/pickle ball courts were to become available this sort of facility should have some sort of booking system. For example, for people from outside of the city to drive in and then have to wait for courts at Lakeside rather than book a predetermined time is a deterrent for us to playing tennis.
566.	Do not listen to anything Nelson's city planners have to say. They will ruin everything.
567.	Space for track and field, indoor walking for seniors, pickle ball, rugby, ultimate frisbee and more could all have space to play if we had access to more and a bigger indoor soccer pitch.
568.	It is an absolute must
569.	We need to renovate or upgrade current facilities before expanding the number of activities available.
570.	All the services should be affordable to the average wage earner in Nelson and there should be subsidies to make it affordable for low income residents. There should be shower facilities etc for homeless.
571.	Please don't use this project as an excuse to raise taxes. It would be great to keep it real and true...only spending what really needs to be spent, not to pad budgets or get increases in taxes passed...
572.	The rec center already has a major lack of parking, and we have a housing crisis. If we are to build a new facility or to expand the facility we have these factors need to be addressed
573.	You state that recreation is more than Physical Activity, so where is the space our kids and teens can go to foster their creativity ? We do paint giant mural through town, but as far as this presentation shows little space is made for our artsy people. Where is the space for creation and imagination ? Where is the space for Music too ? Does our town even have a marching band ? How to promote things that are not only Sports ? Anima Sana in Corpore Sano ... a sound mind in a sound body. How do we create a sound mind ? Younger people tends to be more medicated for Mental ailment than ever before, how do we as a community tackle it ? We need a year-long space available for them, and not just an afternoon of playing with colours during school breaks.

574.	Instead of raising taxes, have a look at the books and trim some fat, or get a new accountant and quit spending unnecessary money. From a locals perspective, the NDCC has been mismanaged, and in the last 5 years has been closed more often than open. Operating under new management would give the place a bit of wind in its sails and fresh eyes would promote more community usage.
575.	absolutely no to increasing property tax....user pay!!
576.	Please consider the benefits to all user groups. Meeting the needs of children is essential however don't discount the incredible health benefits for seniors to remain active, eg: more Pickleball, Fit for Life, and Silver Strength opportunities. Please provide more parking options or whatever changes you make may still result in underutilization because of parking constrictions. Thank you for your thorough planning and public consultation.
577.	Poor management of the existing facilities to allow them to deteriorate to their current condition is not acceptable. Having community facilities is important in particular for families and seniors.
578.	We deserve access to affordable and quality recreational facilities comparable to other communities.
579.	it is important to reopen the theatre, which is especially important for kids and teens curling clubs are an important recreational and social gathering for all Canadian communities and desperately needs to reopen
580.	Prioritize the campus based on the community demand for use. Find a way to use hot water for ice floods. There are alternate methods for generating heat for facilities and for making hot water, such as wood fired boiler utilizing sawmill residuals, consider this. Indoor spaces should include mutli-use courts for pickle ball, basketball, badminton, etc.
581.	Defined Area E and Nelson are not the only areas which should be taxed for recreation. Many people who live in Castlegar and work in Nelson use NDCC regularly as do folks from the rest of Area E and others. Nelson is the reional hub for recreation and as such taxation must be spread across all areas although perhpas in various amounts
582.	Nothing has been included here about the Seniors Centre. Why not? More programming to keep seniors fit and active should be a priority. The Seniors Coordinating Society provides minimal service and doesn't belong in the Civic complex.
583.	Having a healthy vibrant community is considerably more important than shoving housing in every nook and cranny to increase the tax base.. quality of life is more important than packing the city coffers
584.	Focus to enhance child accessibility to participate in sports.
585.	We lack an entertainment district bylaw therefore music events are difficult to find a space for. Please consider Nelson's reputation as a live music and party leader and provide an appropriate space to host these events for long into the future.
586.	Basketball and volleyball and pickleball gyms in Nelson are either very outdated and in disrepair or in the case of LVR used by so many community groups that there are many user groups excluded from access. It is also closed on weekends and on summer, making it a resource that is not available to the community at all.
587.	I think there is a real disconnect between the needs of families and seniors and what is offered. Try to aim for low cost expansion of family fun and the opportunity for a diverse range of classes offered at times we can attend. Think about parking too. I'd love to see pottery classes, dance classes for kids and adults and some beautiful spaces for people to gather.
588.	Please don't just chase grants - we don't need another glass house for a vintage boat. Please get diverse voices - what do our seniors, children, and folks with diverse abilities need? Our spaces could use more flex - there is no room to gather indoors. What about the library facility? Think about opportunities for co-locating our community facilities and affordable housing. Area E and F need to pay their fair share for the city owned facilities...this needs to get resolved during this process. We don't need to get into a Rossland/Trail type disagreement. Making use of Kidsport or other ideas can work to reduce financial barriers.
589.	Best service for cost effectiveness
590.	Now that so many youth are using the facilities, the Gym at NDCC is too small. Weight-room and Cardio need to expand.
591.	As I've touched on, it would be nice to see some sort of late-night event/concert venue that isn't a bar/nightclub in this town

592.	Healthy projects for children then adults then seniors
593.	We have lots of low income housing opportunities. The front street vacant lot should be dedicated to recreation campus
594.	re-use existing buildings , no tear downs of valuable existing resources to make this project sustainable and not wasteful
595.	There should be pay parking at the ndcc to encourage people to leave their car home, to be more active, and to raise money for the rdcc.
596.	It is importance to have a space for the community- especially kids- that is accessible. I think we take pride in offering so many recreational programs to so many people, it is really special about Nelson, and it would be awful to lose that. I don't want to lose recreational spaces and participation because it is difficult to access or get to- it is really important for our community.
597.	More and mote dance spaces are being lost to capitalist endeavours. Not everything should be about making money. Dancing is healthy and makes happy. Not everyone is a hockey/soccer/sports person. There are lots of tax paying dancers that have nowhere to go.
598.	My daughter would like to see a space especially designed for kids and teens to hang out at the recreation complex - something like a lounge with couches, snacks, pool table, foosball, etc. A place where kids can hang out while waiting for parents to pick them up or while they are exercising.
599.	more social areas for youth (kids/teens) and young adults would be so appreciated, the community has been asking for spaces such as a rollerskating rink for social events, and spaces for inexpensive rent to host social events/wellness events/spiritual events in the days/evenings for the community
600.	Please ensure that all voices are heard and not just the aggressive and vocal groups. The benefits (as per the stated mandate) of recreation for all members of the community should be the priority.
601.	Absolutely need a bike parkade with bike tools station. Also a welcoming outdoor sitting area
602.	1. The Rec Campus should be for present and future recreation, not housing. 2. This competitive priority rating is flawed. Should be collaborative, comprehensive planning. 3. Rec5 has a predetermined plan. Expensive consultants part of deception.
603.	Giving kids extra activities in the winter should be a high priority
604.	I love the facilities we have. It makes living here so enjoyable. I would like to continue to have these indoor options as I grow older in the community. I also worry about climate impacts and the importance of indoor spaces for emergency responses and hazardous weather conditions
605.	Multi purpose sport facility
606.	The Nelson Curling Club has been a big part of this community for multiple generations. It was a strong club and was continuously growing. The Club brought a lot bc of revenue to this town over the years ! I find it hard to believe that the city would to eliminate this important recreation facility !!
607.	I think the future of the community recreation campus should heavily weigh the opinions of the people that live here and less from the local governing group call city council as it seems money has been spent frivolously and unnecessary that has not been beneficial to the community (ie. The glass box that stands erect and empty inside by the Prestige)
608.	A community facility should service the community with low cost available services. Costs should be recovered with fees, events and taxation to make the services available to a wide range of the community. The multipurpose aspect of the facility should be maximized to be able to diversify and cover costs. For example improvements to the rink to be able to host concerts and events to help recover operating costs and reduce expenses to the community. Lounge areas are comfortable for users and available for conference rentals to cover costs to the community.

609.	The question of who pays for what needs to be looked at. It seems unfair to me that people who reside outside the taxation area and regularly use the rec campus pay the same fees as tax-paying residents. I think different fees may not be allowed by law, but it's very unfair for our rural neighbours to not pay their share. And while the majority of people living at a distance from Nelson may not be regular users, lots of people are, so a higher use fee seems like the easiest solution (if permitted). Also, spreading facilities throughout the district has not worked in the past. People want to be in town, for example, if their kids are playing hockey or soccer. They don't want to travel to Bonnington or Balfour.
610.	Nelson has outgrown the gym. We are like sardines in a can in there throughout most of the day. We have enough affordable housing in town. The empty lot next door should never be used for affordable housing.
611.	More attention should be paid to ongoing maintenance of facilities, new or old.
612.	I would like to see affordable rates for NDCC facilities for full-time residents of the region (e.g. more affordable 6 or 12-month passes). I love and value the recreational facilities we have. Thank you for planning for their maintenance and improvement; community recreation facilities are an important part equitable access to a healthy lifestyle.
613.	I don't think that this should cost any more to taxpayers. There have been so many projects, like Hall St down by the water, that have not added any value or beauty to Nelson. Instead of asking taxpayers to pay more, it would be better to divert funds from other projects as this is an essential part of having a community that is fit and healthy and providing opportunities to its citizens. Nothing could be more important than that.
614.	Nelson does not need another or expanded recreation center. What Nelson needs is low income housing and another homeless shelter!
615.	It would be nice for the sports museum to have a dedicated space and other art and sculpture incorporated into the spaces. Combining arts and culture with recreation serves a variety of needs and helps build Nelson's creative reputation.
616.	Please consider changing bilaws or to open a space that local entertainment companies can host events without being constrained to the 2am rule.
617.	Improvements to the NDCC concession could result in a significant increase funds. Why were there no questions about outdoor space? Skate park? Also, very much needed is a full size indoor soccer bubble. One of my children cannot play indoor soccer because it is full and the other was initially placed on a wait list. Indoor soccer tournaments could also have a positive economic impact on community. Curling helps decrease the sense of isolation in the winter in our senior populations.
618.	I do not agree that more taxation is the means to better/more facilities. Better use of current funding should be utilized to ensure maximum benefit to the members of the community. I'm certain that the cost and inefficiency of the bureaucracy at play could greatly be optimized to deliver a better service output to our community. Businesses and humans in general are expected and required to become more efficient and find creative means to evolve as the operating environment requires them to. 623.	We do not have indoor facilities for pickleball that can be used in the evening for all the people that work during the day or are attending school This is the fastest growing sport in North America..Its not just for older retirees its for everyone.
624.	I believe the recreation campus should be reserved for sport and recreation only. There are many unmet needs and young families are openly talking about leaving because of the failure of the city to enhance the campus. I believe a multi sport gym is the highest priority, along with making sure the small rink and curling rink get up and running.
625.	Please consider social housing and other options in RDCK... Some very valuable places to stay and coexist could be created here which could benefit low income families especially, but especially those who support disabled people and children. This locus of community support could strongly enhance the safety and effectiveness of supportive housing.
626.	A stricter parking enforcement. The full lot suggests a busy day inside NDCC, but not so. Today a circled for 15 minutes, but the pool, weight room, sauna & steam room almost empty. There was a lightly attended hockey event with no spectators. Jan 6, noontime today. Generally a beautifully run facility. I'm old enough & travelled enough to know. Good job!!!!
627.	Circus are a great activities for kids and adults alike. It helps creativity, body language, etc...
628.	Living in Area H, we do not attend Nelson for recreational activities and we would not support any increase in taxes to fund same within Nelson and area.
629.	We need to be able to fix and maintain the recreation facilities we have and get them back up and running before we lose them all together. Having a variety of recreation available is important for a healthy community. The curling rink needs to be fixed and we need to make sure there is an indoor facility for soccer/off season training for baseball. We need to keep up the NDCC arena for walking for seniors and for hockey. This town needs two rinks to accommodate all ice users. It is important to keep the civic ice surface operational.
630.	Rec fees are low and can be raised. Does tax need to increase, likely no and is going to be a much higher hurdle to get past the community. When you've considered corporate sponsorship, what's been the feedback?
631.	Stop spending our tax dollars on things we didn't vote for, like the pier sculpture roof thing. It only looks good, it doesn't improve the lives of people here significantly. 638.	An additional Community Recreation Campus is vital to both the physical and mental wellbeing of the community members. This should be a very high priority for all participating local governments to complete asap!

641.	Badminton and pickleball are very popular in Nelson, and the loss of the historic badminton hall to gymnastics 20 years ago was unfortunate.
642.	Pickleball is the fastest growing sport. Currently, the only people that can play regularly are retired seniors yet the growth in younger people is also substantial! We need to offer many more time slots including afterwork/ school hours and evenings and many more courts to accommodate even our current growth.
643.	We would love to see a universal sport complex. We need to keep kids in sports and off the streets. Nelson's council needs spaces for kids and not only concentrate on the housing. There are other ways to fix the housing and it's being done and it shouldn't be councils only priority. If we want to see our kids off the streets, sports and recreation should be a priority!
644.	I am filling out this survey for the second time, because I am now aware of an opportunity for use of the vacant lot at the corner of Cedar and Front streets. I understand that Nelson Cares has a proposal for 50 units of housing plus 5000 sq feet of recreation space (the size of a school gymnasium) with a partnership with BC housing. I think this opportunity should be very seriously and favourably considered. I would like to see RDCK, Nelson City and Nelson Cares collaborate to make both housing and more recreational space available.

648.	We desperately need a multi purpose event space that can support music events such as live bands and electronic music dance parties. We have huge talent and amazing sound systems in Nelson. Finding a space for this kind of event is really challenging. It could be a huge boon to the economy if we embrace the continued development of arts and culture
649.	I am happy with the space we currently have for gymnastics.
650.	I think the property by the crosswalk off of the corner of the rink and curling rink should be used for facilities for Nelson tax payers and not low income housing .Nelson has done a great job in providing low income housing but it's time to give something back to the tax payers in terms of new facilities that will be needed to replace older buildings .I used to live in Kamloops and the city of tournaments would be a great lead for us to follow that would give kids opportunities to play sports and keep them engaged in healthy activities and good habits and have more tournaments to bring money to our community
651.	It has been very difficult to only have one rink during this time. Discover circus is an amazing group that needs to be supported with a new space.
652.	I think there is an increasing interest in basketball and I believe that it provides a valuable and healthy outlet for children that are too often tied to their phones. I also appreciate that basketball is a relatively affordable sport (especially compared to skiing) which makes it accessible to a greater population. Currently there is a shortage of indoor facilities for our kids to play basketball at. Mary Hall is often full with other sports and or activities.

655.	Access should be reconsidered, allowing public to move from one space to another easily, increasing visibility and interest.
656. 660.	There needs to be another properly heated studio room available to accommodate rehab classes for those with physical challenges like stroke.
661.	-we need swimsuit spinners in the aquatic center change rooms. -the alert on my apple watch for "loud acoustic environment " goes off each time i'm in the hot tub room. people raise their voices to speak over the equipment noise which makes it worst. please post "quiet talking" signs, and acoustic dampers to help. it's an echo chamber and is difficult to use as a result.
662.	I would like to see a space with a good dance floor for social partner dancing. There are many adult dance classes that are held in different venues and is challenging to find venues of appropriate size and floor conditions at a reasonable rate
663.	Quality of life means different things to different age groups, fitness levels, and interest. Not having adequate facilities housed in the CRC, such as gymnastics, dance, ice time, and curling is a severe detriment to many people's social, mental, and physical health. Nelson and area has always had a strong curling club, and it was on a path of resurgence with younger people and new players excited about the sport. There really is NO reason why there is not a functioning curling facility in Nelson.
664.	We need a Multi purpose event space so badly! Our dance community has been in dire need and it is such a strong and vibrant community with a lot of support.
665.	This is a great opportunity for Nelson and RDCK to resource share and to envision a plan that meets a broader definition of recreation - more than just physical activity & aligns with the visions of The City of Nelson & RDCK. The City initiated plans for new multi-use facility which included the public library and housing. This is a good time to revisit the concept as libraries are critical infrastructures to enhance the wellbeing of communities. Even if not part of the site, a new or upgrade library/housing project could be part of the planning process to take advantage of funding opportunities, increase taxation, and community support. There are many examples of successful rec campuses that include housing, libraries. They attract visitors and support the values of wellbeing. Any structure must be climate friendly and use sustainable materials to align with RD and City's Climate action plans

667.	Nelson and surrounding area has a vast array of physical recreation possibilities not only in the Campus, also in the Parks, trails, mountains. What we do not have is affordable housing for many people. New facilities and expansion of current buildings should be low priority. Priority should be for new housing, and for renovation of old facilities which need repair and are well used by a spectrum of people, especially in social/team activities, i.e. good for building community.
668.	A lot of people place a strong value on the the cultural aspect of our region. Music is a huge part of this. Let's find a permanent home for dj and live music shows!

669.	We need more community spaces to gather and be brought together. When people dance they are brought together by fun and music and unique fashion, and nelson does not have any good options for night life. No loud music, bylaws that limit and no life on the streets past 2am. where is nelsons fun?
670.	Including a multi-use sport floor in the Community Recreation Campus would address a critical need in Nelson by providing a space for diverse recreational opportunities, including a vital home for the local not-for-profit roller derby team. Roller derby offers far more than athletic competition—it creates a safe and inclusive space for marginalized adults, including women, people of color, and members of the queer community, to engage in physical activity, build supportive networks, and foster personal growth. Adults in particular often face limited opportunities to learn a new sport or join a team, as recreation spaces are frequently prioritized for youth activities. While supporting children is essential, the need for adult-focused programs cannot be overlooked—especially for marginalized groups who may not feel welcome in traditional sports environments. Roller derby is unique in its commitment to inclusivity, welcoming people of all genders and backgrounds to participate in a sport that emphasizes teamwork, resilience, and community building. Moreover, the addition of a multi-use sport floor would enable the roller derby team to expand its offerings to include safe spaces for youth and teens. By providing opportunities for younger generations to learn roller derby, the community could instill important life skills, foster confidence, and build a sense of belonging in a supportive environment. Roller derby's rapid growth as a global sport highlights its transformative potential. It is not just about physical activity; it is about creating healthier, happier individuals and stronger communities. An adequate facility that accommodates roller derby and other diverse activities would ensure this sport—and its many benefits—has the opportunity to thrive in Nelson, making the Community Recreation Campus a true hub for inclusivity, recreation, and community connection.
671.	The civic center facilities are heavily utilized by RDCK residents. On a given night of pickup co-ed hockey, at least 50% of the dressing room is from the North Shore, Ymir, Blewett, and surrounding areas. Tax revenue from the surrounding areas should contribute to the civic center facilities. Alternatively, children's recreation programs by Civic Center leasees are well attended and hard to register children for. The civic arena is also well used. If City residents are solely funding the facility, they should be given priority usage. I am supportive of borrowing and tax increases to fund better recreational opportunities, but I am adamantly against any affordable housing initiatives. The Recreation Campus lands and tax funding need to be used for recreation opportunities and community health and wellbeing, and kept separate from social housing initiatives.

677.	Sport is essential to community health and well being and it would be short sighted to not develop better facilities to meet the aging infrastructure and growing needs of our community
678.	I think that locals don't have extra funds. We feel the recreation sites and services should be a GIVEN in our community. They should service the community. They should ALWAYS PAY their employees the living wage in the area. I think a lot of the services aren't widely known. I think the gym needs to be expanded as it's insanely busy. I think the gym should be used as emergency night winter shelters -all winter long. People are dying in our streets, people are working full time and going homeless. 679.	Increase size of weight gym
680.	It is critically important the space at the corner of Cedar and Front Streets is NOT used for low income or supportive housing. It should be used for recreational purposes to support ALL residents well into the future. We have enough supportive housing and these projects can be done elsewhere. Don't permanently destroy the recreation campus.
681.	The aquatic centre and the fitness/gym are crucial to a healthy community. These facilities should be supported regardless of the cost.

686.	There needs to be a better system put in place to account for the operating costs of the ndcc and civic centre. Ndcc prices need to be higher in order for the recreation centre to be sustainable. The overhead costs of running all amenity's offered for 8\$ does not make sense. Increase the price of these services/ sub divide what services are offered for certain prices. The civic centre and arenas bring in so much revenue to Nelson not just through the hockey tournaments but by bringing family's to Nelson where they are spending money in the community, supporting local business. Must address this first. What do the financials statements look like for the ndcc in 2024? It does not seem like a sustainable business structure. Especially since the marginal quality of the experience is decreasing due to increased use but not increased equipment. Other option is to sell to a private owner who can run the facility for profit and make the centre a sustainable operation. If the city cannot afford the work needed to upkeep the facilities that is. Hopefully without needing to borrow too much, as I understand the rate of interest even for a municipality would most likely be around 5% or potentially higher depending on how funding is acquired.

711.	Please include a space where music events can be held with no noise curfew. Nelson is bereft of music venues. Pubs and clubs are not the answer to a vibrant community music scene.
712.	Civic arena is awful and is the least accessible arena I've experienced. The stairs to enter, the stairs to the ice, and how unbelievably cold it is. Parking lot is not big enough, and fitness classes and swim lessons are very hard to get into.
713.	Community benefit is hard to define but I believe should include opportunities for intersectional connection. Nelson Leafs games for example bring to gather a diverse cross section (age income background) of residents. Other place like this include Capitol theatre civic theatre library.

738.	I think the idea of having a Rec Facility that services all the potential user groups in Nelson is long over due. This is a destination town. People want to live and visit hear and yet we are limping these old facilities along to attempt to meet a growing need. Racquet sports have been neglected for consideration and inclusion in these indoor facilities. Badminton is at Mary Hall and at the whim of Selkirk College's fickle schedule and demands. The facility is make due. The club and community thrived at one point in this town and is now just hanging on. Tennis has never had or been considered for indoor space. The club is fortunate to have a group of good members and board who rallied to build the facility above LVR. Tennis and Pickleball are lifelong sports and need somewhere for people to play 12 months of the year. The Squash Club is privately run by the board and has been in a state of instability for many years. The building is privately owned and has changed hands multiple times. On occasion, the facility has been taken away from the club and left out in the cold. It is an aging uncertain set up and could be gone tomorrow if the owner decides so. Discover Circus has recently been evicted and they were sub letting one of the courts from the Squash Club. A lot of other user groups will likely echo some of the same sentiments. Nelson is housing these groups in old, make shift facilities which are no longer viable. Instead of being behind all the time, Nelson needs to get ahead of a problem, that is not going away, regardless of cost or opposition. It needs to happen fast and have an eye for the future. When my partner and I come to Nelson from Silverton to "go party" we rent a hotel room, we go out for dinner and drinks, we shop at local stores. We spend money in town and enjoy ourselves. 747.	The use of the word "campus" is misleading, pompous and confusing. While "campus" does technically refer to a collection of buildings, it is normally associated with a learning facility, such as a university. Recreation Centre more accurately describes this facility. A big "NO" to campus.
748.	Keep facilities on the basic side to keep costs down and make it affordable for more people to enjoy. No need for fanciness. Just need the facility.
749.	Build on top of the REC parking lot by adding additional parking and a soccer dome on top.
750.	There were more options for music/art events without noise control or curfew.

This campus should also consider the benefits of indoor recreation during the summer (floor hockey? basketball?). Also.... are the plans for an indoor gymnasium to support floor hockey, basketball, volleyball? This is currently lacking.

796.	It's time the city and regional district came together to give Nelson a rec center like Creston's
797.	You guys need to get with the program you're hogging all the space in this town. This town has spoken and that's what we want we want a venue space for music people don't want to go to a bar it's gross and most people are sober nowadays.
798.	Maintain this recreation area as such. Renovation, upkeep, maintenance, development whatever is necessary to keep this area for the whole community's use and wellbeing.
799.	Nelson needs sports, we need to promote healthy living and life style. A new recreational campus is a promotion and prevention strategy. Keep kids in sports and it keeps them off the street. It's two fold. You have well rounded humans you don't need to help house them. 94% of kids that play sport are less likely to participate in recreational drug use. We can not build more housing for a population that isn't growing. Short term work permits do not contribute to a community. Sporting events bring in large revenue when they can hold tournaments. It supports hotels and restaurants in the off season when tourism is low. Nelson needs a recreation complex, we can't let winter sports die in our community
800.	Greater use of multi purpose room. Should be used for expanded fitness facility floor space
801.	Do we really need more low income housing at 824 Front St? We need more LI, but is that the best location? I'd like to see a multi use gym type facility. Also is curling worth the \$4 M reno?
802.	Affordable housing should be the most important priority for our community. This is a crisis and impacts every aspect of our quality of life in Nelson. I would happily pay much higher taxes if it was going towards addressing the housing crisis.
803.	The Rails to Trails should be considered, including use by ATV's
804.	We are lacking a community gymnasium space for court sports
805.	CoN needs to reestablish trust within the community. A series of failed projects and lack of efficient maintenance and plans for depreciating assets has proven their management is unsustainable. The current system is not working. A new building is futile without massive internal restructuring.
806.	The Rec campus is a real asset to the community. New improvements should include an expansion of a library building within the campus, the addition of more gym space, more exercise/ class rooms. Services should be affordable and readily available for all community members.

807.	I have attended a number of public meetings as well as meetings with the Nelson Regional Sports Council. At the NRSC meeting - attended by Councilor Keith Page - it was acknowledged that the consultation process for the potential available plot of land on the Rec Campus has already been earmarked by local governments and Rec Commission No. 5 for a housing project with a small (30%) potential rec component. I think that this has led to an undermining and distrust of the legitimacy of local government and it's commissions comprised of politicians, by local rec groups. I support housing projects but dont support them on the rec campus. A large parcel of rec campus property has already been developed with NO rec component. We shouldn't allow this again. As a resident there is no gymnasium space available for court sports outside of the school district-owned facilities. This should be a priority as the use of gym facilities operated by school districts is a liability for rec groups and individuals. If the needs policies of the public dont align with that of the school district, then there is nowhere for those groups or facilities to recreate. I also would like to add that the space required for a public rec facility for a given activity should be carefully considered, not just meeting minimum space/dimensional requirements, as a situation accommodating minimum requirements would just pit groups and individuals against each other for competition over access to the limited space.
808.	Open to increase in admission costs up to 10%. If there would be grant and/or government funding to help create a recreation campus, I really think it's worth exploring. The NDCC is always packed in my experience, the interest is there!
809.	This space should be used for recreation, not housing, and not for CARES, they already have spaces in town, and are not recreation. The space should include sports that are using private spaces, like squash. We need to keep current spaces for gymnastics and soccer.

811.	Users who do not pay taxes to support facilities should have higher user fees.
812.	Above any recreation use, I would prefer if the unused portion of the campus was designated for a low income housing project.
813.	Community recreation facilities are a MUST and it should not be considered as optional facilities. The benefits of these facilities (and associated programs) go well beyond mental and physical health as it also facilitates recruitment of healthcare professionals and it attracts young families to move to / stay to the area.
814.	Affordable, Seniors, and Low income housing is important BUT not at the expense of the very much needed expansion of recreation facilities for people and families. We are in a crisis here and need to come up with a win win solution for both - and certainly there are other major issues that could be addressed at the same time such as using the golf course rosemont area to address these issues not ONE small empty lot. Also we could move the recycling plant on airport road to behind the mall etc - and look at developing that area or putting a few mobile homes and portables to address the need for drop in centre and showers etc. The City and RDCK need to step up to make the other possibilities on the table so that the community is not pitted against each other further stigmatizing vulnerable or low income populations. 816.	Curling business in Nelson historically built part of the current campus. Seniors and all benefit from life long activities like curling as a national pastime. Curling welcomes people from around the world during ski season.
817.	Soccer please. Improve the soccer situation for indoor and in general to provide better year round access with more space.
818.	Over 20 years ago, there was a referendum asking if we wanted to spend more to expand the NDCC. We agreed we did. We voted to as well. We were very disheartened to see so much of the money go to the hockey arena although hockey may seem like everything to many people, the reality is the majority of people in the Nelson area do not use it or partake in it. We think it is very important to expand other areas of the NDCC to carry and cater to other community groups aside from hockey. We were very dismayed all those years ago to see such little money initially put into the pool and a few years later everything needed to be redone, tiles were falling from the ceiling. 822.	There has been much investment in affordable housing. There has been little investment in new or upgraded facilities. Population has increased. We have little in the way of track and field. An indoor soccer venue would be well used.
823.	Fee structures are very imp. Seniors should be considered a high priority age 65 not 75. I was considered a senior from 60-67, then that was taken away from me.now I have to wait till I'm 75. The rate that is considered low income is higher than poverty rate in BC. I don't know how what they did in raising prices was even legal. So disrespectful to seniors.
824.	I think our current, even updated, infrastructure of our pool and gym are bursting at the seams (parking included, however the minimal parking situation likely encourages folks to consider biking/walking/transit if they are able) Same holds true for our soccer facilities. Evening and weekends are so full! We have to put caps on the number of teams allowed in leagues because there isn't enough field time.
825.	No more low income housing
826.	Creating affordable housing mixed with the concept of expanding the weight room makes alot of sense to me. Expansion of the weight room would be much less costly given the grants available through BC housing. And taxes and revenue from the housing facility would benefit tax payers and users. A win win.
827.	Please don't close the soccer facility
828.	Please move forward with a larger recreation campus. Recreation is so important in developing well balanced children and keeping people of all ages active and healthy. Nelson has a long and dark fall, winter, spring season with tough weather. We need space to continue to recreate during those times. Put the building blocks in place to develop healthy adults by supporting things for children so we can hopefully have a healthier generation coming up.

833.	RACKETBALL, SQUASH & CURLING FACILITIES ARE EXPENSIVE TO BUILD AND MAINTAIN. THESE SPORTS ARE NO LONGER POPULAR AND WOULD SERVE VERY FEW INDIVIDUALS. PICKLEBALL IS VERY POPULAR FOR ALL AGES. IT IS PARTICULARLY A BARRIER FOR YOUNGER PLAYERS AS "CLUBS" MONOPOLIZE THE COURTS. YOUNGER PEOPLE NEED ACCESS TO PICKLEBALL COURTS OUTSIDE OF DAYTIME SCHOOL AND WORK HOURS. UNTIL A FACILITY IS PROVIDED PICKLEBALL NETS SHOULD BE SET UP AND MAINTAINED AT LAKESIDE PARK FOR CASUAL USERS. RARELY ARE THE LAKESIDE PARK TENNIS COURTS FULL. 850.	Re do the curling rink in the existing spare space. Include space for housing and a gym for silks. Once this is complete, remove old curling building and indoor football. Replace with modern gymnasium, fitness centre and swimming pool. Renovate old gym and swimming pool to new housing.
851.	I believe the recreation campus now is awesome and completely fine how it is. We don't need to build onto it or make it super huge. It doesn't need to be so fancy. 875.	the cube climbing gym is not big enough for its demand. it is always so crowded that it is not safe for children or adults even with the capped limit. it is a great activity and very popular in Nelson and deserves a bigger space
876.	Community Recreation Facilities greatly benefit people of all ages in our area and would likely attract people and money from outside as well. It would improve health and well being, as well as likely keep people off the street.
877.	It is sometimes very hard to get parking at the NDCC.
878.	Because I use the fitness facilities at NDCC the most, I will speak to that first. A significant increase in space to this part of the complex would be helpful. As an active user, I find it too small for the demand. There are times when it's hard to access machines and equipment in this area due to the volume of users. I'm grateful we have a fitness facility that is affordable and accessible to the community but the size needs to increase. Parking is also limited, and could use more spaces to accommodate all the facility users from inside the city of Nelson and folks coming from outside Nelson.
879.	Our current facilities is that they are often near or full to capacity, when in use at least by myself and my family. 882.	My biggest concern is that some facilities will be closed down but there won't be a replacement for many years leaving us without access to indoor field or gymnastics etc at all during that time
883.	Please consider using above market housing developments as a source of financing for these projects. Developers should contribute to the community through affordable housing or helping fund community resources. Look into city of Vancouver's community Amenity contributions (CACs) as precedent.
884.	I believe the campus should have pay parking. This would increase revenue and support those users that walk, cycle or use public transit to gain access. Lower your age restriction for Senior's status to 70
885.	I think the cost of the ice surface maintenance and equipment for skating and curling is absurd, and a ridiculous and disproportionate use of resources.

A proper indoor soccer dome that kids can play in year round and adequate arenas with ice so all skaters and use the ice for their pursuits.

894.	We feel a multi-use gym for a variety of recreational purposes is very needed in Nelson and would be very beneficial for youth, middle aged adults and seniors. We especially need a facility for Pickleball. At this time we are only able to offer Pickleball for seniors. We would love to have a facility which would allow growth of our sport for all ages. Pickleball is physical and it also a place for social connections which is very beneficial for physical and emotional health.
895.	Would love to see indoor tennis! My whole family plays outside in the summer but then no option for this or badminton even all winter We love being a part of indoor soccer and would love seeing that facility upgraded
896.	I have lived in this community over 40 years and have seen capacity for recreation diminish. My daughter was a figure skater, my husband and I curled and attended many sporting events in the arena. I worry for the well being of younger families in this community.
897.	More parking is needed at the NDCC. The swimming pool, hockey arena and fitness center are well used and should be the priority. Please put in more parking.
898.	We need more winter pickleball space
899.	Our community is growing. The need is there. Do not over price so people cannot afford it.
900.	1. Transparency and open-minded is key: Your Campus includes lots and yet it appears that you have made some commitments to Nelson Cares re housing. Please put this on hold if you wish to ensure credibility of this process. 2. Usage fees are incredibly low at fitness Centre. Increase could be manageable and beneficial. 3. Taxation needs to change to include the full regional district. 4. This Council needs to back off the focus on housing. Firstly, it is not part of the municipal mandate. Also, a culture is being created that cannot possibly match reality: The number of housing units added and/or planned within the last 10 years HAS to exceed the demand of Nelson residents. I believe that people are moving to Nelson with the attitude that they are "entitled" to a house. Some people that live here have the same attitude: The pier is an excellent addition to the waterfront that all can enjoy and I don't see why the average resident should give up nice things in our community to "house" increasing numbers of people. I realize that meeting basic human needs can have a positive impact on health and well-being, and ultimately our streets as well, but this Council is over the top and needs to take a step back before any recreational land is used for more housing.
901.	Need to provide for existing sports that have completely lost their facilities first, particularly ones that have been important to the community for decades (curling). A housing project should not take up space on the Rec campus.
902.	We could really use more ice available in a predictable, quality way.
903.	It it feels like facilities are becoming more and more busy. It is hard to know whether this is due to the lack of other resources in the area. For example, the weight room at the NCC is regularly full of teenagers. Is this because they are lacking other facilities at the high school, or even other activities in which to participate after school? These facilities are fantastic and some of the best I have visited in the Kootenays. It is hard to plan for future activities when sports such as curling seem to have a lower interest in upcoming generations. The only other thing that could be nice is a large indoor court facility for basketball volleyball, etc..
904. I suspect that there are some difficult economic years ahead of us here, and we need to focus on maintaining what we have rather than expanding. If you just briefly look as you walk and drive around Nelson and Area E and F, you will notice many, many existing local government owned assets from streets to sidewalks to retaining walls to water and sewer facilities that are in need of maintenance. Boring old maintenance of existing infrastructure should be the RDCK and City of Nelsons focus for the next five to ten years, and not bling, bling new. Existing sidewalks, active transportation infrastructure, sewer plant, paving existing roads like South Shepard Drive I could go on and on and on. How about some toilets and stairs at five mile beach? This stuff is not politically sexy but neglected and ignored. I ask, where's the plan for this stuff, where's the list of budget priorities for maintenance of existing infrastructure? Jeez...
907.	Discover Circus will need a new facility come October of 2025. That means there will be no circus facility to service the 400+ members that take classes through the program. I would very much like to see a circus training facility with multiple spaces to run multiple classes at a time, ranging from small kids 2yrs to adults of all ages, and adequate space for instructors to prep and train for teaching. The circus community in Nelson is thriving and growing and I believe it is a very important part of this town's culture that blends sport and physical/emotional wellness with the arts.
908.	Tear down the old building and start fresh instead of ongoing Reno's
909.	Demands for hockey, indoor soccer and pickleball seem to be high in this community. These sports should be the priority for any new or enhanced facilities in my view.
910.	It seems as though our population continues to grow every year. The participation in sports like soccer and hockey are increasing every year as well. Would be so great to see a new soccer facility to accommodate several teams practising and playing to ensure everyone has a chance to fulfill their passions of playing
911.	Having not delved into the minutiae of this - the buzz I hear is a fear of housing being the main focus. I hope that isn't the case. Strong offerings for recreation etc. have crucial benefits to the community. There are better places unless it is somehow encapsulated and doesn't diminish recreational offerings.
912.	We Do Not want more affordable/low income housing in this area!
913.	We desperately need affordable housing for our working poor. It is the first defense against mental illness, addiction, crime and suicide. Please show the hard working people of our community you care for them and appreciate everything they do to keep our beautiful home functional. Thank you.
914.	I believe we need a facility that is open and accessible to ALL residents of the Kootenays. We need to look into other cities and how they have facilities that are open and accessible. Yes recreation is wonderful but looking at the Oslo Norway library, it was classes that are FREE and believe everyone has the right to education, recreation, and a place without judgement. Yes it would be great to have nicer facilities and an outdoor track but I would also like to see free and non judgemental options for all residents.
915.	I would like to see facilities to expand indoor PB which is the fastest growing sport in the world and provides physical and social benefits. Also it's a shame for Nelson to loose the curling rink given the long history of the sport.

929.	Having a community recreation campus is integral for the overall health and wellness of the community.
930.	Electoral voting areas should not be adjusted or perceived to be adjusted to accommodate a positive outcome in an failed first vote referendum
931.	Should be located so as to minimize required winter driving for majority of users
932.	To our family is very important that whatever the new campus is, that we make it affordable for people paying the taxes and also those accessing it. 933.	Please help to ensure that the Civic Theatre gets through these challenging times. It's a tragedy to have to go to Castlegar to see a film right now.
934.	No more taxes for the residents. Use private investors and let the people pay that use the facilities.
935.	Racket courts are needed in the area. Squash club is expensive and there future is unsure current space. Also has outgrown current space. Pickle ballers would also love indoor space to place.
936.	There is no current gym to play basketball, volleyball, pickelball, etc other than school facilities. Currently You have to rent SD8 gyms and they are not N/A on weekends and holidays! We need a Publis gym. Nelson Hoops membership is growing and youth/adult basketball is strong ion Nelson area!
937.	**Dear City of Nelson** The ongoing neglect and lack of support for the maintenance and upkeep of the curling rink have caused significant disappointment within our community. This facility has long been a cornerstone of our community, providing a space for recreation, competition, and social gatherings. Its current state of disrepair is not only disheartening but also a reflection of a failure to uphold the responsibilities entrusted to the city. The curling rink is more than just an ice surface; it is a place where residents of all ages come together to foster a sense of community and tradition. Also disappointing that if a child has swimming lessons you must pay for them to swim for any period of time afterwards on top of the swimming lesson fee now. It is unaffordable to some people and unfair to the child. Doesn't make much sense if you are already paying to be in the pool for the lesson. I think it's important to have indoor recreational facilities in our community as well as a basic movie theatre. Money isn't being spent wisely... The warf by the prestige is a prime example of money that could have been spent in other places. Our taxes keep going up and we really arnt getting anything more. 4.	There have been many housing projects lately and little improvement to our rec facilities in years.
5.	I'm all for a mixed use recreation facility that also adds to housing inventory. There are many professional landlords who will disagree.
6.	It is impossible to find affordable housing here. There are barely any long term rentals and especially in the winter with increased rent costs for "seasonal skiers". Making over the minimum wage or livable wage and I still struggle to grocery shop to feed myself. My hydro bill is insane in the winter because where I rent has thin windows and baseboard heating. People are struggling and landlords choosing to rent a 1 bedroom for \$1800+ is insane. There's also no space for someone to have a pet in their rental and be able to actually have their landlord renew their lease. Paying \$900 for a single room in a small home is insane. There needs to be more options available for renting. Long term, cheaper rent, better heating, pet friendly, accessible. If this doesn't become a low income space I hope the city implements a cut off for rent based on square footage of a rental unit, also for units that are basement, no access to backyard, horrible heating, old homes with poor windows and high R values. The majority of renters in this town are struggling to get by.
7.	I think there is need for housing and if the building can be both recreation and housing that is great!
8.	Seems like affordable housing is the highest priority but if we can fit in something that enriches peoples' lives (like recreation) it's a good idea. I don't know if you'll fit an indoor tennis court there though! That's my dream.
9.	It's time to start focussing on the community that is here and move away from focussing on affordable housing. We all know it's unaffordable to live in a gem like Nelson . The reason that pricing for rents and for home purchasing is so high is because everyone wants to live here, let's get over that fact and move towards improving community features

52. Affordable housing is a separate issue to this recreational planning exercise. Agreeing on a plan for recreation is challenging enough without the inclusion the controversial housing crisis topic.
53. This is a valuable space that needs to be designated for recreation. This space should be used for the expansion of the current fitness space. Add squash courts and workout rooms. It should be for the use of the entire community, not housing.
54. The current NDCC space seems at capacity often, more room is needed to expand gym space. Could use this land for an expansion to the existing building. Could expand parking under building, build up above new soccer centre, multi use sport court area, indoor track etc.
55. We need both updated recreation (a gymnasium for multi-use) and affordable housing (if it is actually affordable housing, unlike some of the other recent projects labeled as such).

56. Music venue and affordable housing are both important to the community
57. They should put recreation building all together so that it's more convenient to access . They should put the affordable housing building away from the recreation building.They can also put accesible bus stop the low housing building so that they can go whatever they want to go.
58. Quality affordable housing is important to the community. I do not support development that does not incorporate Net Zero Carbon use.

62. Nelson has a serious housing crisis. There are so many working professionals, creatives and even wildland firefighters that I have personally known that have not been able to secure housing in Nelson and have had to move on to other communities. Even those who were born and raised here are having to leave, not because of lack of jobs or education, but lack of affordable housing opportunities for themselves and their families.
63. We need affordable housing
64. Both are important
65. We have to accommodate our kids and community over MORE low income housing. Sport keeps kids busy, busy kids are less prone to turn to drugs and alcohol. They are less likely to need low income housing in the long run if we let them play sport. We have multiple new projects that are affordable housing options. (One by Dairy Queen, one by safe way, one on the rec centres other corner, the large ones in rosemont, not to mention the hot mess of mobile units at the hotel on the north shore) Creating more is not the viable solution at this point in time. Preventing people from requiring low income housing is an upstream solution. KEEP KIDS in SPORTS, give them opportunities to succeed, to join the community.
66. The housing situation is incredibly dire. The functioning of our entire society depends on addressing this crisis.
67. The city should not use my taxes for housing. I would prefer my taxes go to recreation.
68. Affordable housing if that means that it is supporting working people and families; ie, job is required and it is not supportive housing with no actual supports.
69. The community needs more affordable housing. Housing is a non negotiable human necessity and both the rdck and the city need to address the lack of housing as such
70. I would prefer it to be used for a space for all the community to use and enjoy instead of housing.
71. I don't think the fitness centre needs to be expanded now. But the property would be suitable for future aquatic or fitness centre expansion. I don't think the property is suitable for housing. It is surrounded by institutional (rec centre) and commercial buildings and is on a busy intersection. It would be better to sell it, for commercial use, or trade it for property elsewhere in the city, for park or recreation use or for housing.

87. There is already insufficient space in current facilities. And not enough parking to support NDCC (no available parking most weekends). Adding affordable housing will mean no parking ever unless a parkade is build which will increase costs to users.

227.	There are lots of spaces in Nelson where higher density affordable housing could be constructed, but this space should be dedicated 100% to community recreation. Once housing is developed, there will be no further opportunities to expand or improve on this critical community resource.
228.	The combination of housing plus recreation makes the most sense.
229.	We need more housing options in Nelson. What good are improved recreation facilities if people are stepping over unhoused people sheltering in the entry ways?
230.	We need affordable homes for our working population.
231.	I do not think it will be developed for recreation without other purpose. To expensive and not fully sustainable.
232.	Safe, affordable housing is a human right. We need more affordable housing in Nelson to thrive as a community! Recreation is also important for a healthy community, but the space proposed for affordable housing has not been used for recreation in the past, so the housing project would not be eating up any current recreation site space. 240.	I'm all for affordable housing but housing should not be the only focus of the city. We pay taxes and should expect something in return. Look at the affordable housing that has been added in Nelson. Time to consider other projects.
241.	Expand the fitness center and have a few apartments available for decent people and young couples. Don't give them to drug addicts
242.	Affordable housing is obviously an issue, but given the demands on the existing recreation facilities are only going to increase with the population increases it seems like there would be a better lot to build more affordable housing.
243.	There are many other locations around Nelson, the NDCC campus and entire block should remain focussed on recreation.
244.	Recreation is needed. Affordable housing is always a challenge and I look to other areas including Victoria for examples of how this has really not achieved intended outcomes, particularly for the cost of it. This is a site where recreation occurs and kids can play. What will the governing entities do to ensure that affordability does not come at compromised public safety?
245.	There are not many open spaces in the city, and the proposed lands are in a prime location near the center of the city and adjacent to existing recreation facilities. The lands should be used to the benefit of all area residents, not permanently committed to a couple more affordable housing units. The City of Nelson owns many properties around town with structures that are in poor repair. Converting or demolishing a structure that is too costly to upkeep for an affordable housing project makes more sense than using the very limited space around the NDCC. Many social housing initiatives already exist in the city, with several more at advanced stages of planning or execution (Railtown, Fairview, North Shore Inn). I believe too much emphasis is being put on these and related projects, and there are finite resources (land and funding) to be shared between other interests. I want development of the recreation campus area to focus on increasing recreation opportunities for area residents. Nelson attracts individuals and families who are active and want access to recreation opportunities, especially during the work week and off-season when some outdoor activities cannot be done. The existing recreation facilities are well used, and near capacity at peak times. The area's population is steadily increasing, so expansion of facilities will be required to continue offering quality opportunities. The proposed land could be used for open gymnasiums (indoor soccer, badminton, volleyball, basketball, etc.), racket sports, or expanded fitness center facilities (the current fitness area is very busy at key times). The soccer facility and curling club are both in poor shape, so there may be an opportunity to redevelop these facilities. If funding is an immediate issue, the area could be left green or made into outdoor facilities (mixed use courts) relatively inexpensively and accessible 8 months of the year. Alternatively, the area can be made into parking until funding is available to develop recreation facilities. All of these ideas leave open the option of developing new indoor facilities 5-20 years in the future as populations and demand increase.

252.	I fully understand and support the need for affordable housing, but I believe this particular piece of land would be better utilized to enhance recreation opportunities in our community. 318.	The city is in need of more spaces for community to have an active and healthy lifestyle, which is something Nelson is known for. Affordable housing is important, but not allowing building projects like Halo would be a better answer to that problem.
319.	Affordable housing is a major social determinant of health that has benefits beyond the individual. Providing affordable housing works up stream to address one of the major causes for ill health and thus the burden we are experiencing today in the health care system. Stable and affordable housing for all means that people are more likely to find and sustain long term employment, have adequate consumption of micro/macro nutrients, decreased mental health concerns, and more. Upward of 40% of renters are considering leaving the area due to the cost of housing which will cause significant brain drain for the community in the long run. Having affordable housing means the community can more sustainably staff rec centres, health services, grocery stores, and all other essential services needed to care for the aging population in Nelson. Long term development in the area will be significantly hindered if the working class cannot afford to rent a home, let alone purchase one, thus decreasing the use of these rec/community spaces as well as funding to support them due to lower income and increased access on social services. Affordable housing is a no brainer in Canada and arguments otherwise are typically from a group of people in society that have already benefited and will continue to benefit intergenerationally from the lower cost of housing in previous generations.

Possibly even harder since many of the rentals that are available are not available to you due to income limits. 392.	It makes sense to keep the recreational facilities and options together in one place. It allows students to walk from school to their after school sports. Affordable housing is absolutely needed in our community but it shouldn't be included in the campus. As our population grows so will our recreational needs. 599.	As a homeowner, I am astonished to hear from friends about the extreme cost of rentals in the city, and the 0% vacancy rate. Housing has been declared a human right by the UN and by the federal government, and it appears our governments are failing to deliver on that right. The BC Centre for Disease control mentions the cost of housing as a principal indicator of health outcomes, highlighting that nearly half of all renters in Nelson are paying more than 30% of their income on rent (http://communityhealth.phsa.ca/HealthProfiles/HealthReportFactorsThatAffectHealth/Nelson). They site that >30% is considered unaffordable, and that the large cost of housing means there is less money to use for healthy food and basic living costs. These worse health outcomes from the cost of housing will ultimately impact our struggling healthcare system, so this investment in people now will ultimately have compounding benefits. Additionally, in the recent draft budget which the city of Nelson sought community input on, I noted that the housing reserve only have \$26K or 0.0009% of the total budget. Compare that to policing, which has \$5.5M or 19% of the total budget, more than all Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services, Transit, Library Grant Transfer, and allocations to the Airport, Bridge, and Affordable Housing Reserve COMBINED! Regardless of your feelings on the effectiveness of police, I'm sure you can understand how this seems dramatically out of balance if the goal of the city and region is foster a well-rounded community that offers a fulsome suite of reliable services - including public housing - to the citizens who fund it. I sincerely hope that the RDCK and City of Nelson, along with the provincial and federal government being to treat citizens with respect and dignity, and use this project as a jumping off point for a generation of public housing projects that are created for public good instead of treating them as profit-driven commodities.

In Vancouver, seniors share the indoor and outdoor tracks and have safe flat places to walk on. Fitness helps people stay out of hospitals and their mental health. Families need recreation spaces. Nelson is bursting at the seams and families are suffering and not getting enough time for sports and working adults can't be expected to forgo or have to have late night times or have to drive to Castlegar or trail for their activities. 1013.	In the last 10 years, Anderson Street has been built, as well as over 200 units for Nelson Cares, plus a Workforce Housing project for Share Nelson. The North Shore Inn is under renovation for over 20 people, and plans are in the works for more workforce housing by the Chamber Building and up by Mt St Francis. Mount St Francis completion as well COULD open up some housing. Surely, in a town of 11 000, we have enough units and need to think of things that benefit the entire community. Less and less people have access to garden space, as any space where a garden could grow is being build over. The Flooding risks increasing with it. Housing is an issue, but resilience and access to food source is important too. If there is nothing the city can do to temper the overbuilding on private land, then it is your duty to keep some green space, even if this one is not nicely located and barely used. It is the responsibility of the municipality to provide land without delay to meet the dire need for housing, per the recommendations of the Federal Advocate for Housing in Canada and her recommendations that all levels of government respond with swift action to increase non market options in our housing market. As well, the recent Nelson housing report and assessment reflected the need for housing, and our community has one of the highest provincial rates of homelessness. Nelson needs affordable housing to increase social stability for those people living in poverty, recovering from mental health, abuse, substance use or other situations, single parents etc. Provision of safe housing is the first step towards advancing people in rehabilitation, and allows care teams to connect and provide home support or nursing support for seniors or others with health concerns. Affordable housing should be prioritized on all city owned land at this time to fulfill the observations of the recent report on housing need that was filed this fall. 1077.	Recreation is more important.
1078.	Make Hellhole Nelson into affordable housing. Preserve these places for community enhancement. Once it goes residential, it will never go back.
1079.	I have worked as the Emergency Housing manager with Nelson CARES and affordable housing needs to be a priority to help address the housing crisis Nelson has been in for the last 7 years. I fully support City land being allocated to support affordable housing initiatives
1080.	Housing is a human rights issue that will always take priority
1081.	It would be good to provide affordable housing for residents and combine recreation facility if possible.
1082.	I was excited to hear that Nelson cares had put forward the proposal for the unused space on that corner. I think affordable housing is something to be focused on at the moment. If that housing can also support some form of indoor recreation that would just be a bonus. I can't come up with any ideas that would use that space for recreation that - isn't already covered by the NDCC - the things I would like to see added wouldn't fit in that space. I'm sure there are good ideas for the space and if it will help get approval for the housing I'm all for it. If the recreation facilities being included weren't going to add any value or make it so the project gets approval, I'd prefer to have only the housing and updates to the existing NDCC and Nelson city facilities (like the curling club).
1083.	Nelson is always in need of affordable housing, so I agree this should be prioritised - however, this should NOT be done at the expense of recreational spaces and resources to keep existing recreational communities alive. What's the point of living in a town if the community resources and recreational communities have all been squished into nothing?
1084.	we have enough low income housing funded by municipal government. Funding these projects does nothing for tax revenues for municipal coffers to aid in services such as the rec campus.
1085.	Being able to address both needs in one project makes sense to me.
1086.	curling, soccer, sport & fitness
1087.	We are living a housing crisis and lots of people are looking for affordable housing. I think it important to take care of the population of Nelson. In another hand, we are lacking recreational facilities and I would love for Nelson people to be able to keep practicing their favorite activities
1088.	As a single parent and rising costs and not a lot of places to go, even if it was for people who worked full time and still can't afford rent
1089.	Spa in fitness studio is not adequate. expansion needed. Space in weight room not adequate
1090.	Both are greatly needed
1091.	Affordable housing is a big issue. But I also encourage planning for long term population growth with regards to recreational program needs. Portions of the recreation complex are quite busy at times, and it would be good to take advantage of the opportunity to expand the NDCC with part of this vacant property, before the recreation complex is over capacity from population growth.
1092.	I understand the need for affordable housing in Nelson, but we also need affordable recreation for at risk youth. Hockey is expensive and out of reach for people. Our soccer program is currently robust and doesn't require any assistance. Nobody is interested in curling. Raquet sports, basketball, bowling, etc are inclusive and low cost to the user. Please diversify what we have to offer and make this truly great city even better.

1093.	We have a pretty amazing facility, but Nelson and area is growing. Maintaining space and capacity where the NDCC and Civic Centre currently exists leaves the door open for future expansion. Nelson has seen a large amount of affordable housing go up in the past several years. I would guess better per capita than most BC cities. This includes the Nelson Cares development at Hall St which was an area that could've been used for expanding recreation opportunities.
1094.	Probably best to spread some of recreational activities to less congested sites in the city possibly industrial land near waterfront? This would be a good site for affordable housing
1095.	This is top priority for the community
1096.	We need affordable housing.
1097.	Like I said earlier, no need to expanded or add another recreation facility. Nelson has a great one. What Nelson needs is low income housing. As well as another homeless shelter!
1098.	This town is already over populated. Build space for the people that already live here
1099.	I really want to see the added affordable housing, as long as it doesn't take over any existing recreational buildings (ie the curling rink as that building should be re used for a multi use sport centre, preferably indoor soccer) but it would be nice to see the NDCC expand its gym facilities to add box gym style units to open more space for gym users. I 100% support more housing, but I do not want it to encroach on existing and future recreational uses.
1100.	We need housing
1101.	What an awesome opportunity to provide two things which are community desperately needs. Affordable housing in the downtown core so close to opportunities of physical health and well-being of the rec centre. Let's do it!
1102.	Multi level with housing on top of something like a gym or climbing wall or squash court or something
1103.	Place to have music event of any kind
1104.	Should be a parking lot
1105.	The only way the NDCC will expand is to link with affordable housing on the city land. Rick has had the land fir many years and nothing has happened. This is a window of opportunity to ought back on affordable housing that is a provincial priority today.
1106.	Selkirk College location is too isolated and lacking visibility for a showpiece climbing gym.
1107.	There is no one at Nelson Cares skilled or qualified to direct or manage this or any other of their current housing projects. Please do your homework. Ask for proof of experience and qualifications. A power hungry property manager from T.O. has no business leading this or any other project in our community.
1108.	Unless there was adequate space to fully rebuild the curling rink/indoor soccer, yet still provide some housing units, then I think this is the only way to justify housing. No housing should take the place of this recreation-zoned facility.
1109.	NDCC needs to expand as it is over capacity. Surely the affordable housing could be planned somewhere else in the city, such as down on Lakeside Dr where there are those empty lots.
1110.	I think that mixing a small amount of recreation with residential contributes more to community building than just having residential
1111.	We need both
1112.	Love this idea!
1113.	This area was expressly purchased for use/expansion of Recreation activities by earlier City Councils and this should be honoured. The corner of Hall and Front St.was already removed without the electorate being consulted.
1114.	We don't need any more housing in this area and once it's auctioned off to BC housing it may never be what it was intended for. Create parking that you charge for and create revenue. This will allow more people to use the facility and generate more revenue for the center. It's a win win.

1115.	This area is zoned for recreation and focusing on preventative programming (ie keeping kids involved and busy with sports, indoor safe spaces to do activities that regulate and improve the nervous system) will benefit in the longer term. Also, safety is of the highest concern for kids walking to their recreation programs and waiting for rides after without potentially high risk behaviours from those who tend to be in Nelson cares housing.
1116.	We have enough subsidized housing in Nelson! We need to realize that Nelson as a city has zero industry. The city needs tourism and amenities to be offered not only to locals but also to outsiders who have money and may consider making Nelson a destination stop. The demographic of people in Nelson will continue to change.
1117.	Affordable, healthy, and energy efficient housing is priority. Added Recreation is a bonus, if it makes sense and deems to be important.
1118.	Not low income, but rather affordable housing is most necessary. We need housing for the young middle class population in Nelson. Recreation is an amenity that we already have plenty of and it is effecting far less of our socio-economic status as a community.
1119.	Because people need to do activities to stay physicaly and mentaly healthy. Especially during the winter. It is a key piece to a healthy society
1120.	I think we have a high need for both and if there's some way to effectively combine them then that is great.
1121.	I think there are way more options of places for housing. This space is so integral to our recreation community, which affects so many people. Party of that is the accessibility and proximity (to other recreation facilities, downtown, and schools). I believe housing will remain a priority, and can more easily be successful elsewhere, but recreation will have a harder time recovering or moving forward.
1122.	Desperate need for affordable housing.
1123.	The NDCC is in need of an expansion due to increased demand. Parking is a challenge and the gym is overcrowded. This SHOULD NOT be more affordable housing!
1124.	I think affordable housing is a priority, but that can happen anywhere, like the golf course imstead of luxury condos. In town there is a need to community spaces that are accessible to foot traffic. This spot may serve better for a venue space, but housing is critical too.
1125.	we NEED affordable housing. we would benefit from more recreation facilities
1126.	Oops, I guess I mostly answered this question in the previous section. Any and all additional affordable housing for Nelson community members is only a positive in my book! :)
1127.	Both are needed and it fits with the spirit of the space
1128.	Affordable housing is becoming a crisis in Nelson. I am a relatively privileged individual and finding affordable rentals has become very challenging. I pay 50% of my income to rent. I want to see the housing insecure folks with more options as well. I was appalled that the city spent so much money on a pier when there was an encampment at city hall. I am appalled by the Hallo Nelson proposal. We are a small community and the local population is being pushed out by gentrification. Balancing recreation and affordable housing is important to community wellbeing
1129.	It's not a desirable location for housingâ€¦ better location to grow our recreational facilities. Private sector will not invest in recreational facilities so best to use this as community space.
1130.	There are other applicable areas that would be suitable for affordable housing. I want my taxes to pay for recreation.
1131.	A balance of affordable housing with fresh recreation spaces to support our growing community are both needed.
1132.	I've been told that 30% of the proposed structure can be used for recreation and would not require borrowing or tax increases. 100% no brainer in my mind and of course will put a dent in our dire housing situation.
1133.	Both are important

1134.	If you put recreation beside residential units you better put good money in sound insulation. A beautiful two story high building seems ideal for dancing. But we need numbers to make a better decision here. How many affordable housing units are we talking about. I'd hate to see people on the streets because the wealthier want more recreation units that won't be accessible to the people living right next door. Now how ironic would that be
1135.	I personally am BARELY getting by and I am on welfare assistance. I cannot get a job and believe me I've been trying since April. It seems like the cities version of affordability isn't actually all that affordable and I wish there were more resources to help.
1136.	While I do want housing there as someone who has been homeless. We need more green space that isn't pay to rest. Like all the restaurants taking over community spaces downtown. We need more benches in the city too.
1137.	Why would housing even be considered on the campus recreation property? There are other property locations around that are more conducive to housing.
1138.	Let's keep areas where families are enjoying recreation totally separate from housing
1139.	There is only so much space in proximity to the recreation center to develop and expand the recreation center. The onus for providing a lot for affordable housing should come at the cost of recreation. I am very in favor of Nelson creating affordable housing, but I think there are a number of other options.
1140.	Nice to help everyone
1141.	It is already to dense and congested in that area to put more housing.
1142.	I've heard people say the fitness centre needs more space, so adding it to the 3rd and 4th floor of affordable housing makes sense
1143.	Although affordable housing is important so is recreation.
1144.	Recreation programs on first floor available to community such as classes and affordable housing above.
1145.	Affordable housing is really hard to come by in Nelson. We need to prioritize that. The recreation facilities also need to be expanded and enhanced because they currently do not provide all services (community gathering and art space) and for current activities are too small for the demand on them.
1146.	RECREATION, NOT AFFORDABLE HOUSING!
1147.	Our community is growing and the existing facilities and parking cannot accommodate the current need. There are many affordable housing projects already on the go, let's focus on recreation.
1148.	There already is lots of affordable housing
1149.	Housing is desperately needed in the city
1150.	2 levels of parking, 1 level of recreation and 12 levels of housing
1151.	Housing should be mixed and never just affordable. There's cost savings to be had by using some of this space for recreation as well and allowing it to meet the needs of more residents
1152.	The gym needs to be bigger.
1153.	Expansion of the fitness centre. Another soccer pitch - would also be used for other activities
1154.	NO !!!!! This is a prime centralized recreation complex. KEEP IT THAT WAY. Move the housing project to another area , and allow the recreation facilities to stay together. We need the recreation for the entire community. Housing at this location is a HORRIBLE idea.
1155.	We have enough affordable housing options in the area. We need services to bring more people and improve the health and wellness of our current population.
1156.	multi use - well thought out and benefiting the community
1157.	Why should housing be put where the recreation center is.put it down on the maglio land or next to the wholesale store. All that land is empty and a total eye sore
1158.	Affordable housing is a crisis right now. Recreation facilities are not. Future recreation facilities could be constructed at other locations if necessary. I also believe that expansion could take place at the current location if necessary.

1159.	Make it a housing Co - op. Not for profit. This will keep rent lower & the rent monies will go for to up keep of the property, not into one's pocket.
1160.	I would like to see supported housing for youth and or homeless or under housed people. But I would be happy with affordable housing where pets are possible.
1161.	Although I am not opposed to affordable housing, I don't see where residents will park, and the proximity to the NDCC and the additional recreation space will already be more of a burden on limited parking. Maybe there is underground parking planned? I think that in a six storey building, the recreation portion should be at least 1/3 of the space.
1162.	Priority should be given to the current residents by improving the recreational facilities. Building more housing in that lot would be a terrible idea by both lowering the money available for recreational activities and making them now available to more people, thereby diluting the quality and quantity of services offered. It is already almost impossible to sign my kids up for activities because spots get taken up so quickly. Building more housing will only make that worse.
1163.	Combination of both with housing and recreation sharing space in a building.
1164.	We are deeply in need of more affordable housing
1165.	Nelson is full of greed and high rent.
1166.	People's basic needs have to be met in order to even think about using recreational facilities. Housing is a human right and basic need and should be seen as a priority over recreation.
1167.	I believe that area is allocated for recreation
1168.	Nelson as more than adequate affordable housing.
1169.	Expand the gym
1170.	Finally, space in the downtown core is needed to provide essential services to a growing population. We should not be sacrificing it in order to create subsidized housing. There are a lot more places that housing can go, including the Regional District. Adding housing in this location will not reduce the opportunity for future expansion of facilities that may be needed, but also will exacerbate the already overcrowded parking at the facility. Chasing grants to come up with some hybrid will only result in a bad fit for both. Also, the downtown core and the waterfront should be the most valuable real-estate in the city. Creating low-income housing and shelters in the downtown core diminishes the potential for development, and reduces, rather than enhances the quality of life for all in the City, with possible exception of those benefiting from the housing. If you are looking for space to build affordable housing, and combine it with recreation, I hear we have a golf course....
1171.	Affordable housing needs to be part of the plan. It would be wild to plan such an enormous repurposing of land without, addressing the immediate housing crisis. It's really just a drop in the water in terms of addressing the need, but I wouldn't support a plan that doesn't include affordable housing.
1172.	If both housing and recreation can be incorporated into a solution then it's a win-win as both are needed. If the space has to be one or the other then affordable housing should take priority considering that it's a crisis situation. We already have robust recreational programming at existing facilities whereas we do NOT have enough affordable housing.
1173.	Affordable housing should be the priority
1174.	Recreation isn't important if people cannot afford to live here. Affordable housing helps ensure a diverse and resilient community.
1175.	There are other city owned properties, this should be recreational use
1176.	Lack of both in the city.
1177.	The curling rink closure affects a lot of people. Also a bowling alley would be a good idea as well. Nelson needs more options for recreation . Not everyone fits into the same box. There are other places for affordable housing.

1178.	Affordable housing should come from government incentives to promote building at a higher density. Delete the red tape and let the free market work along with programs to incentivize building. These facilities are currently in need for the active tax paying population and are also a way to help intervene and reduce the amount of next-generation homelessness. (Team sports and mentorship through recreational programs are shown to have huge positive impact on youth in compromised home environments).
1179.	Only recreation, this is a recreation area, and we don't have enough space for all rec programs. That should be the priority. Housing should not be on the table for this space. The city is constantly building new housing, this space needs to address the recreation activities that the city/rdck do not currently provide, and parking for the existing facilities. Housing should not be going in, or considered for this space.
1180.	I don't really care all I care about is the venue space and so does everybody else.
1181.	recreation facility below and affordable housing above
1182.	The City of Nelson has a high percentage of affordable housing for the population base, with other affordable housing projects already in the works. The area would better be used for a recreation facility considering the number of citizens that would access the facility.
1183.	Include recreation if increased users are anticipated and more space is needed to keep quality of experience high.
1184.	Our community needs affordable housing. Connecting it with recreation would be more appealing to the community and make the residents feel more like they belong to the community
1185.	Housing crisis is obviously a massive issue in our area as well as across BC. But I think this is a perfect opportunity to use the space provided
1186.	I think filling tall buildings with more people will simply put more strain on our current resources- not enough doctors, longer wait times, less available jobs for people showing up here
1187.	I think that whole block area should only be a recreational facility including keeping and fixing the needed curling rink.
1188.	Fixing the economy starts with housing, but enjoying life is important along with suitability. Creating housing but not low income, as Nelson does not need to be a housing place for low income. Nelson doesn't have general supports for low income/homeless as it is so to half support it would be a waste of money. Bring the rent down for the middle class
1189.	As an administrator for a local rec organization I feel strongly that the city needs to devote money and effort into this aspect of our community. As a homeowner I can empathize with members of our community who are being priced out of living here and affordable housing should also be a priority.
1190.	Homeless and drug issue making Nelson challenging to live for ordinary citizens I worry about my 12 year old just walking around
1191.	Mental health and emotional well being needs are important originally agreements dŸ™•
1192.	It seems like the weight room is over crowded or there is more need more space for group fitness programming or recreation groups. It makes more sense to me to enlarge the current rec centre/parking area to accommodate the increase in Nelson's population.
1193.	We need both
1194.	Recreation is as important for lower-income people than it is for higher-income people.
1195.	It is imperative to provide recreation opportunities for our youth especially and the citizens of our community. By doing this we are allowing them to live a healthy lifestyle which in turn will keep them off the streets!
1196.	The RDCK should sell this property and use the proceeds to fund the recreation campus initiatives. The RDCK does not have in its mandate to provide affordable housing. Please stay within your scope
1197.	Expand the complex have a proper meeting room, expand the gym, parking, proper concession with real concession food, bigger universal change rooms

1198.	"Affordable Housing", another white wash term from the planning world! Housing subsidized by taxes; lets be clear and transparent for once please. Since when has housing been affordable: 1984? The City of Nelson and RDCK already have enough existing recreation space which could be much better utilized or should be demolished. The existing Civic Centre rink, gymnasium(s) and curling club are vastly under utilized. All of these assets are inadequately maintained now, and taxation is presently a significant portion of most property owning residents monthly spend. I'm not in favour of more new large recreation infrastructure, until the existing old is considered and a plan fully developed to bring them back or demolish them, including tight costing, not pie in the sky order of magnitude nonsense. Costing should include taxation affects. The existing Civic Centre roof repair bill should set the stage for this conversation and should be referenced as a cogent example of maintenance ignored for too long.

Create a space dedicated to recreation use, make it state of the art, make a statement for the Kootenays, open sporting competition opportunities and build and income stream for our community.
1202.	We need affordable housing. If it can be combined with enhanced community recreation facilities I think that is a win for the community
1203.	We do not have enough child care spaces to support our community needs. Having space co located with affordable housing enables residents of the housing and areas around to ensure quality child care while they work and participate in our community.
1204.	If there is funding for affordable housing and the future income could help offset a rec facility that makes a lot of sense. The rec area seems small so not sure what useful space could be there that we don't already have
1205.	As much as housing is needed, the property on/around the recreation campus is extremely valuable for future considerations. I would not want to get caught in 20 years time that the facility have no room to expand.
1206.	Yeah no. No housing. You dumb to wanna build right next to a highway. Keep it ndcc and build them gym bigger. I will make sure everyone stays awake if they build houses on the lot.
1207.	There could be an indoor space for pickleball and apartments above it
1208.	There is a great need in our community for the young and old to have space to recreate safely. Our current facility is far too small for our community.
1209.	we need more recreation space in this town.
1210.	We have more than enough affordable housing projects done or being done per capita in Nelson. Leave this area clean and recreational only
1211.	The housing complex is too large
1212.	Affordable housing isn't really affordable if you can't have pets, can't have children, can't have parking etc, there is still too much criteria that limits who can access. We need to reduce barriers not create more. Housing needs to be more accessible, we have plenty of empty suites in Nelson.
1213.	We desperately need affordable housing for young families and couples. These living spaces need to be a decent size and not micro living spaces. The housing also must be affordable for working couples and families rather than single low income/no income people. Trying to squeeze in more facilities into this area rather than allowing for decently sized homes is the wrong approach. Tiny 400sq foot apartments are not appealing to anybody.
1214.	Housing is affordable already.
1215.	There are other locations for housing and although you did not give this option I would like to see that space be for parking and recreation. The only way I would approve a joint venture of recreation and housing is if there was parking below ground, recreation on all of first level and then housing on upper levels.

1216.	The city is growing which means we need housing and more space for recreation to accommodate people
1217.	The Library already has a proposal for a new facility that includes affordable housing. It has already gone through feasibility and planning. Save time and money and go back to looking at this plan.
1218.	Our community is becoming saturated with "affordable housing". I believe strongly that recreational facilities help our children succeed in life, so they don't need low income housing.
1219.	This is not the best location for affordable housing. Keep all the recreation areas together. Nelson needs more indoor recreation spaces and affordable housing but that's should be some other location.
1220.	This is a great idea for mixed-use development that provides multiple benefits to the community.
1221.	Affordable housing is badly needed.
1222.	the corner is too busy for housing, we need it for NDCC
1223.	This could be a good combo but I think we need a new indoor soccer facility that is larger than the one we have.
1224.	Both are essential needs within our community
1225.	This is a recreation campus we are talking about. Why is affordable housing included here?
1226.	that area is on a huge slope and im not sure what kind of recreation could really be squeezed in to that space. Housing could be a better option as we are severely limited here in Nelson.
1227.	Housing is (very) expensive in our community. One of the solutions is to move towards higher density housing and a multi story unit would do that.
1228.	Our community is in dire need of more affordable housing, so I feel this is a priority. I really like the idea of incorporating a recreation space into housing as a way of integrating housing and community activities and of meeting additional desires for recreation space.
1229.	Safe affordable housing is critical to the community well-being.
1230.	The land is limited in the City of Nelson. There is already a large chunk of the Recreation Campus allotted to affordable housing. We need to keep our youth, and all citizens of Nelson (and area) active and taking more of the rec campus away does not help keep us all active. I 100% disagree with this lot being put into affordable housing. We need a new indoor facility for soccer, a gym for indoor sports- skipping, volleyball, basketball, martial arts, indoor hockey...the list goes on could be put there.
1231.	There are lots of available developable lots in town. Keep the recreation campus for recreation. Use another lot for the housing. The land is so limited on the campus, it is too valuable to use for housing. I'm not sue that the user group parking has been thought through either.
1232.	If I had to choose, I'd prioritise housing, but if it's possible to combine housing with needed recreation facilities, then I choose both.
1233.	Our community center is very full during peak times and with a growing community the needs for a bigger facility seems likely. If the recreation was a priority and then the affordable housing could be attached in some capacity that would be a good idea as well
1234.	There are many areas in Nelson & district for affordable housing. This prime spot should be in line of recreation. Would the affordable housing project help finance the much needed upgrades & maintenance to our recreation facilities?
1235.	There are very few community gardens in Nelson. If the building goes up there should be a community garden on the roof for the residents and green space up there should be prioritized
1236.	There is a recreation facility deficit in the Nelson Area and a very limited amount of space. There seems to be more space for housing.
1237.	If the property is to be sold for development it should be sold at maximal market value. If it is being kept for local use then it must be completely covered by grants

1238.	Nelson Cares has enough facilities in Nelson. Recreation facilities should be a higher priority than more subsidized housing.
1239.	Nelson is a town where it should be a privilege to Live. When you work hard you deserve to live in a nice town. There are plenty of opportunities in norther BC for jobs and to make money to then be able to afford to move back. You should not get to live in an idyllic town because you want to, and then expect the town to float your living expenses. I worked very hard to get a degree, moved away to do so to be able to move back.
1240.	There are currently multiple low income housing options being discussed or in the process of being worked on that have not been completed or started. I don't feel that adding another housing project to that list is beneficial at the moment. Focus on the current housing projects and finish them, use that open lot to expand the NDCC and provide more services out of it.
1241.	We need more affordable housing and already have recreation facilities.
1242.	We have a serious housing shortage in Nelson. Anything we can do to help should go forward
1243.	It will not shape the numbers of homeless people in Nelson
1244.	We do not want the RDCK to expand in any way. We are already paying too much taxation for too little services. Efficiency, efficiency first and foremost
1245.	The gym space is limited at the complex and actual gym space for adult sports can be limited, but more housing is also needed locally
1246.	Nelson has a severe lack of affordable housing. It is an area with abundant outdoor recreation and a decent offering of indoor recreation already. Funds where available should be used to improve and expand on recreation (eg. curling rink) but affordable housing is much more important in the community.
1247.	I believe that Nelson already leads the area in affordable and low income housing.
1248.	I think recreation is super important for nelson, since its such an active community
1249.	My explanation reflects my response to last item in Recreation section. It is not clear from the diagram showing an orange NDCC rectangle if it is an extension of the current building. I assume it is and is on the section of the corner lots owned by RDCK. All through this survey you refer to this as a Recreation Campus. It will be very important in decision making that consideration of next steps is decided not only by the Rec. Commission. The need for housing has to be deliberately included, not off to the side, and decisions not heavily influenced by the people who use the facilities currently, and are also more likely to have capacity to be vocal than vulnerable people who need housing. Thank you.
1250.	Please provide facilities for the residents of Nelson who currently live here. Rather than trying to expand more housing for future residents. We already don't have enough recreation space for the current population. Recreation facility is too small
1251.	Both are important for a vibrant and healthy community
1252.	My life has and health have been destroyed but housing insecurity, housing unaffordabilty, predatory landlords and the unsafe/unsanitary slums I've been forced to spend the majority of my income on with little accountability for landlords, despite using services like a nelson cares advocate to help me navigate these horrors.

1253.	I am very supportive of more affordable housing being built in our community. I would be fine with the entire site being used for that and Nelson CARES Society is the perfect operator, but I think you will get more community buy-in with some additional recreation space (unless you can get it from where the curling ring, civic arena, and indoor soccer fields currently are). Badminton (and pickleball) at Mary Hall is always extremely busy, often above capacity. Creating space on the community recreation campus for it would be good. As well, the one fitness room at the rec center could easily be expanded to two or three, it seems there are always competing interests for that room. Classes like Spin fill up immediately, it would be wonderful to be able to offer more of them. Additionally, having a daughter who is more into creative recreation, like dance, gymnastics and music, it would be great to see them prioritized as much as hockey. And it would be amazing if there was space at the rec center for less sporty parents to hang out while their kids are in activities, with a few comfy chairs, etc. The two or three benches currently available are sparse and uncomfortable. A place to play ping pong would also be lovely. I haven't mentioned rock climbing here because it's my understanding that you are supporting a new climbing gym by the current one at Mary Hall, but I would like to add that that is a huge priority for me as a resident.
1254.	Venues are already over utilized or in need of repair and or replacement. Fitness and community are important for health of a small community.
1255.	I'd like to see more businesses being established for people of Nelson to have more job opportunities.
1256.	I believe affordable housing is severely lacking in town. If there were some recreational opportunities that did not have a financial barrier preventing all but the wealthy from participating I could support that.
1257.	Nelson needs more affordable housing. This will be of benefit to our community on all levels.
1258.	We have to meet the needs of people already here not more housing
1259.	I would like to see it being used for affordable housing and recreational purposes. Six stories seems high for our town, but I know we are in great need of more affordable housing.
1260.	The city can't handle the current population with water shortages etc.
1261.	I believe either affordable housing or recreation would be an amazing use of the land. However given the proposed Halo Nelson development I think the city needs to highly consider upgrading the facilities that already exist and investing money into making those buildings functional- while using as much space as possible to allow a normal person with a low/regular income to be able to exist in this town.
1262.	More people need sustainable housing.
1263.	If a housing complex is to go in, then one would assume that use of the NDCC recreational facilities would increase too, therefore the facilities would need to increase in size as well. More housing should be a first priority given the need.
1264.	I think affordable housing is incredibly important, but I also think that recreation is important too for people's mental health, to keep them busy and to give them a place to go
1265.	I think accessibility to recreation for the community is more important than the few affordable housing units that could be put in that space.
1266.	If we are in need of relocating some relational facility needs maybe this corner could be useful if not let's put in more affordable housing
1267.	We desperately need more affordable housing. Its a bonus that there is recreational space that will be included in this proposal!
1268.	We need affordable housing!
1269.	THIS IS FOR COMMUNITY RECREATION. NOT TO SACRIFICE FOR HOUSING.
1270.	It would be great to get additional recreation space. Good for body, mind and spirit. It helps individuals socially and emotionally, and a could be a space that is rented out, and creates an income source for the city. We also need to support those who have low income and are in need of housing.

1271.	The gym facilities get extremely busy. I would like to see more space added. There are other spaces that can provide affordable housing opportunities, but the NDCC remains the best option for recreation in the area.
1272.	Why not use the space for the most benefit of the community. Affordable housing and recreation could be amazing in that space.
1273.	Housing elsewhere
1274.	The use of this site for new recreation build is very unlikely to be a financially palatable idea for the tax payors. This housing project is a very thoughtful use of a challenging site and housing is a huge need in the region. There is plenty of other land on the campus that should be used for recreation.
1275.	Build a condo elsewhere - this space is for recreation - how about a new bigger soccer facility - housing is for elsewhere - this space is for recreation
1276.	Recreation space will bring more business to the town's tourism to allow current local sports association to host bigger events and promote our town. A town without a good recreation center, is not as attractive for people to move here long term. There has been a lot of new buildings in town in the last few years, but not improvement for those new or old residents...
1277.	Looking at maslow's hierarchy of needs, it's impossible to deny that having safe, affordable housing is a base need and right. Although recreation is important and valuable in our community, I value housing those in need more than a new pickleball court.
1278.	I wrote a lot in that little box. Lol. Affordable Housing could be an operational complement to increasing the recreational utility of the block. Similar to market housing atop storefronts allows for utility, land use, capital utilization, and operational benefits over single use. If that sort of opportunity is available here, it seems it should be seized. Equally important is avoiding a project that is the worst of both worlds if the coordination costs are too high and any efficiencies are eaten away by complex governance or competing interest without clear lines of responsibility and accountability. The housing should make the improvements easy or cheaper and largely pays for itself, either outright or through clear and persistent benefits to the primary function of community recreation.
1279.	Although recreation is important, HOUSING IS A BASIC HUMAN RIGHT and should be the priority in our community due to the lack of safe, affordable housing options
1280.	Try and utilize the space - ensure adequate parking
1281.	It is time to update and expand our recreational facilities. It has been neglected for too many years in my opinion. Affordable housing in a different location.
1282.	Enough low income housing in Nelson. We would be attracting people from out of Nelson to live here and not contribute to Nelson's economic base.
1283.	The entire area should be used for recreation. It is the recreation hub of the city. Keep it that way.
1284.	We have a housing crisis in BC, affordable housing is necessary. As well, it would be good to see additional space such as an event center or an open gym that organizations such as the boxing club, an event center, or an open space other user groups can use
1285.	There seems to be an Industry counter to Nelson Small Business & Tourism associated with the Nelson Cares Business model. We need housing that a 20 year old restaurant or retail worker can afford, BUT this needs to be separate to the industry of Nelson Cares. Their model brings more no working individuals to our community and does not fully address the needs of the working class whom keep our tourism sector running!
1286.	The entire recreation should be maintained for recreation. It is central, located next to other recreation facilities. I also thought that the lot was zoned as recreational.
1287.	It's a recreational campus. It's zoned for recreation. It's what makes this town great to live in. More housing doesn't belong here
1288.	Affordable housing is a HUGE priority in Nelson, and this seems like a win-win. What a great place for folks to live, so close to recreation opportunities!

1289.	We need more opportunities for recreation especially during the winter months if people can't afford skiing/snowboarding type of activities. There is not enough options for families to do with kids in the winter, especially with small kids
1290.	We are so very limited with the options for recreation in our growing town. There needs to be more available for people who live here to maintain quality of life.
1291.	What makes that site the right fit for housing? The Rec Centre is already bursting at the seams. Hemming it in with more housing feels prohibitive to the ability to allow recreation services to grow with our community.
1292.	Affordable housing could go elsewhere in or around the community. The recreational facility should be right where the other recreational facilities are as much as possible.
1293.	There are other areas of the city that can be used for residences. I think keeping the designated area just for recreation benefits the whole of Nelson.
1294.	We have affordable housing. We have more and more housing in this town but we need space for activities and community events
1295.	Expand the NDCC.
1296.	We need it
1297.	I stand opposed to giving up precious civic property to yet another low income housing project. With 3 major projects underway I'd suggest BC Housing and CARE Nelson wait before biting off another. They need to see how their current projects impact the community and allow the community to then decide how they'd like the next one to go. The North Shore Inn has seen substantial push back from local resident due to the lacklustre public consultation that occurred before the project was approved by the city of Nelson. BC Housing asked residents within 60m to comment.. that equated to approx 3 houses. This is an unacceptably low level of public consultation for a project that will have huge impacts on the neighbourhood for years to come. Hopefully further consideration is being taken on this piece of vacant land before the city approves another project in this area. If and when housing is decided to be built there, I see absolutely no reason why rec services/facilities couldn't be the primary tenant for the prospective build with low income housing helping build the foundations of such a project and fund the rec services being built on site. Allow housing to occupy some of the same foot print but perhaps the BC Government and BC Housing would assist with costs and include their vision for the property along with the sports and rec vision to be a unified and non-segregated build.
1298.	There has been a huge focus on affordable housing which we need, but we have also had a lot of affordable houses projects go in or in the works. Our community also has a huge need for more recreational facilities and programs. What we currently have is not meeting the demand of our community. It would make sense to use the land adjacent to the existing facility to expand.
1299.	Hard to put the curling rink on the 3rd or 4th floor?!
1300.	This is prime space for recreation purposes. Possible to find sites for affordable housing in other areas? There is already one affordable housing unit beside the rec centre.
1301.	I think a mix would be the best option as this benefits all members of the community - those who require affordable housing, and those who own a home but wish for more recreation facilities.
1302.	Nelson has too much low income housing attracting people to it
1303.	Multiple use facilities will garner far more public support than a single user project
1304.	a one stop area where residents can access health services - counselling, check ups, eye exams, pharmacy, wound care, indigenous health practioners
1305.	Don't think it is an appropriate spot for housing
1306.	the majority of people will use the rec centre facilities whether they are rich or not! We have enough affordable housing for the poor
1307.	People that need affordable housing usually don't have cars. Don't allow cars in this area(just bikes & E-Bikes. Maybe also a daycare

1308.	This is a prime area already for recreation. It would be great to see this continue to be used as such and improved on. This is convenient for families to be able to use multiple parts of the facility all from a localized area. On the other hand, there are lots of other locations within the City of Nelson or RDCK that could be used for affordable housing. Please keep this a core recreation area and also create affordable housing in other areas.
1309.	My understanding is that the housing portion of this will be mostly funded by provincial sources. I'm OK with a mix of housing and recreation as long as it does not impact having 2 hockey rinks and sustainable indoor soccer.
1310.	Shared land, shared use.
1311.	Both seem important.
1312.	We need more affordable housing in Nelson. Smaller, affordable apartments
1313.	I think both are equally important
1314.	It would be nice to incorporate housing and have a banquet hall type setting attached. A good example is the Creston facility setup.
1315.	Sports and community synergies can best be supportive of each other in one location. Also more environmentally friendly. Nelson Cares can find its own locations and grants without involving RDCK tax dollars for bad and expensive management debacle.
1316.	Not a fan of Nelson Cares and their policies. So I do not support them in another housing project.
1317.	It only makes sense for the climbing gym (if one is to be built) to be located near the NDCC. (Keeping rec together?) Our town does not need more housing or people. We are running out of geography, resources, parking, services, and space.
1318.	Between affordable housing and recreation there simply isn't a choice. Affordable housing is what Nelson needs. People need to have a safe, clean space to call home that isn't going to completely break them financially.
1319.	It is not an ideal location for housing, but we need more.
1320.	I think having a building that has recreation space (larger studio that could also be used as an indoor gym?) as well as housing is the best of both worlds.
1321.	see previous note
1322.	Please stop creating more projects for affordable housing. Nelson is becoming a regional center for the unhoused and addicted. Tourism is suffering and the town is radically changing for the worse. Please consider the folks that aren't unhoused as well. I'm not an uncaring citizen but I feel that there is enough already and at this point it feels like we are attracting troubled people instead of tech, tourism, or new industry.
1323.	The term "recreation" is not specific enough to allow for a decision on the use of the allocated 5000 square feet. What exactly would that area include and be used for?
1324.	High fences and access from Nelson RDCK to allow a parent to safely play with young children. For instance...This one in Kelowna is accessible to all levels of safe playing. https://www.westkelownacity.ca/en/parks-recreation-and-culture/julia-s-junction-inclusive-play-space.aspx
1325.	Both affordable housing and recreation is lacking in Nelson, therefore would be beneficial for two reasons
1326.	Location is very accessible for downtown and transport etc. so seems good location for affordable housing.

1328.	Affordable Housing if Nelson/RDCK find an appropriate spot to build a new facility. If that is not considered, then both with the majority going to recreation.
